FOR FREIGHT AGENT

To have the government handle fast freight lines and take over that one phase of transportation is the suggestion of Frederick C. Rowe, commissioner of immigration at the port of New York.

Commissioner Howe believes this could be managed just as the parcel post system is, under a separate division of the post office department. This would centralize the problems of transportation for the whole country, as nothing else could while the many different private companies are handling the actual work.

Naturally, the interest of the rail-handling freight of the country is to carry the freight that brings the highest return and best insures the longest haul over their own roads. There is little consideration of the needs of the nation as a whole or of how best to serve them.

The parcel post system has ruined nobody, although the express companies raised a loud howl when it was first proposed. In the present transportation confusion there is undoubtedly a large enough field for service to introduce efficiency without crushing any enterprise worth saving. If it is necessary for the government to become the single operating agency of the various freight lines of the country, it will do it and do it right. We bet on Uncle Sam.

THE FACTS ABOUT WAR NURSING

- One graduate nurse to every 200 soldiers is required.
- About 5 per cent of an army is sick or wounded all the time.
- In a war hospital there are usually one nurse for every ten patients.
- An American Red Cross nurse in war service receives \$30 per month.
- The personnel of a large base hospital unit is 50 active and 15 reserve nurses and 25 active and 25 reserve nurses' aids; proportionately smaller numbers for the navy detachments, with the emergency groups consisting of small reserves easily mobilized and available either for army or navy hospitals.

Washington, June 30.—For the average American woman who wants to help her country in this war by going to the front as nurse there is no hope of her ever realizing her wish. Only graduate trained nurses are chosen by the American Red Cross for war hospital service. And nurses' aids are also specially trained and chosen with the extremist care.

In previous wars, women nurses were not infrequently seen on the battle field. In war today they never get any closer to the front than the base hospital, which generally is out of sound of the cannonading. The machine gun and the barrage of modern warfare has forced the retirement of women into safer fields.

For the first time in the country's history the United States is sending to the front a modern hospital equipment. Uncle Sam's sick and wounded in France will receive as good care as they could get in any hospital in the United States. The best surgeons and the best nurses in the country are going with the troops. When the American Red Cross was organized in 1905 the principle was adopted that not merely trained nurses but nurses of character and experience vouched for by recognized hospitals could be enrolled in the Red Cross service. She receives only \$30 a month while in service. Her hours of work at the best hos-

pital are irregular but mostly long. General Pershing's contingent probably will be served by army nurses who were on the Mexican border.
