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WHAT ENGLISH THINK ABOUT THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

We Americans still think fairly often about the Revolutionary War, and for many people there was doubtless something almost comic in the visit of the British Mission to Mount Vernon to lay a wreath upon the tomb of Washington. But is there anything comic in the morning's news of a Confederate memorial erected upon the battlefield of Gettysburg? And now that Britain and "her late revolted colonies" stand shoulder to shoulder against another enemy can we find no lesson in the way in which the wounds of that civil war have healed? We need not forget the pride and glory of revolutionary days, but we might forget all the bitterness. It is commonly said that it is the victor who finds it easier to forgive and forget. Britain, the vanquished, has done both. It is literally true that you could find no Briton from Land's End to John O'Groats who would not at once admit that the revolt of the American colonies was quite justified, that it was brought about by a stupid king and a stupider political party. Even the school books of Great Britain explain the loss of the American colonies in a temperate and reasonable tone, with regret, but without blame, while most of our school books still make the children feel as if they ought to be on Bunker Hill, musket in hand, ready to fire. England has learned her lesson—and, after all, what more can be done with a lesson than to learn it?

A famous Englishman lately said that George Washington was not only the Father of His Country but the Father of the British Empire. By this he meant that lesson had been learned and that it was because of George Washington that Britain had since his day never lost a colony across the seas. And if a truce for the moment be declared as to Ireland (which is, after all no colony) none of us can deny the kindness and wisdom of that British colonial policy which has today made the whole world-wide Empire rally to the little home island in the North Sea which faces Central Europe.

It is only natural that the Revolutionary period should bulk larger against the American horizon than against the British. It was the beginning of our national existence; it was a small part only of a confused and trying period when England fought Napoleon. Times change. France first saved England, and England, wakening from her lethargy, now saves France in turn. And it may be that the Stars and Stripes fluttering on that western front will save them both.

With peace must come new friendliness between all good nations of the world. But long before that, in the smoke of battle there in France, will disappear, it may be prophesied, the last bitter traces of that early Revolutionary conflict. Old Glory has floated over Westminster and the Houses of Parliament. The Union Jack would today not look badly on the Bunker Hill monument.
