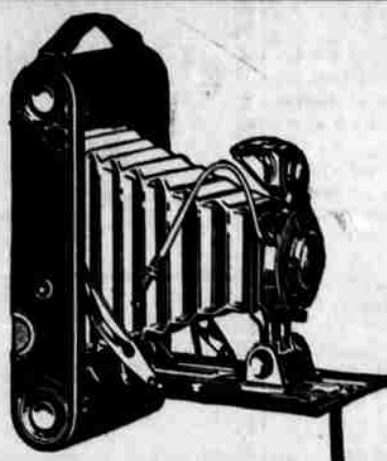

GEORGE BEBAN IN QUAINT DRAMA TONIGHT

George Beban, the celebrated exponent of Italian characters, who recently scored such a success on the Paramount Program in "Pasquale," will be seen at the Globe tonight in "His Sweetheart," a story written by himself and Lawrence McClosky and produced by the Oliver Morosco Photoplay Company under the direction of Donald Crisp.

Mr. Beban's interpretations of Italian characters are in no sense caricatures, but sincere portrayals of the temperamental, excitable and lovable Italian alien in America. He selects his characters from the lower walks of life—the laborer, the peddler and the small merchant, those who are trying to make themselves good citizens of their adopted country.

"INTOLERANCE" IS GRAND GRIFFITH PHOTO SPECTACLE

D. W. Griffith's latest spectacle, "Intolerance," which will appear at the Globe theatre, July 11 and 12, is such an extraordinary theatrical offering that words fail to convey any idea of its magnitude and grandeur, its marvelous spectacular effects, its human interest and its amazing reproduction of historical events. In "Intolerance," there are four separate stories, each with its own set of characters. Ancient Babylon, Judea of the time of Christ, Paris during the reign of Charles IX and a modern American city are the scenes of these stories. Such film stars as Mae Marsh, Robert Herron, Seena Owen, Margery Wilson, Miriam Cooper, Lillian Gish, Tully Marshall, and Bessie Love have the leading roles. A feature of the production is the musical score which is interpreted by a symphony orchestra of thirty pieces.

For the past six months this Griffith masterpiece has been playing to crowded houses at the Liberty theatre, New York. Long runs in Chicago, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, San Francisco and Los Angeles also evidence its remarkable popularity.

The city carriers also voted to hold their next convention at Astoria the last Saturday in June, 1918, and elected the following officers:

President, D. R. Grush, Astoria; vice president, John H. Goin, Albany; secretary, Fred P. Holm, Portland; re-elected; state vice president, Forest G. Driver, Portland. No delegate was named for the national convention for the reason that it is thought that they will not meet this year on account of the war.
