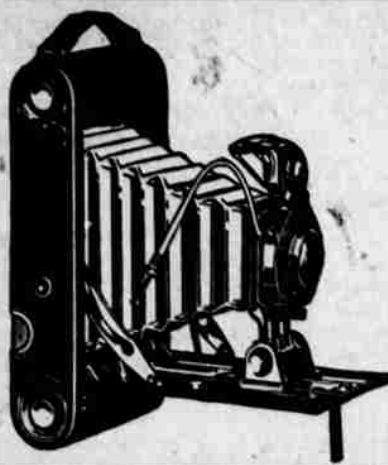
Ladies' Roman Race—Bertha Blancett won. Time, :34.

WAR STRAIN AND THE NEED OF RELAXATION

Marshal Joffre, who stood at the Marne and saved Paris from the German invaders, said a few days ago, "A soldier must play as well as fight or he is not a good soldier, just as civilians must rest and play to be most efficient in their work."

This doctrine has been put into practice by the marshal himself and by others in high command in the French army. In the first stress of our emergency our people were prone to overlook this highly important fact. For instance, it was at first predicted that

our greatest national game—baseball—would die a sure and quick death in the early part of the summer; that the people of the nation would have no time for sports under the press of bigger affairs. However, today there is more interest than ever being manifested in pleasures of this sort because the need of relaxation from sterner things has been fully realized.
