#### A NATIONAL SPIRIT

In the Sunday Oregonian of July 8, just prior to the opening of the annual meeting of the National Education Association, appears an article written by Ellsworth Benham of Portland, apropos of the discussion of the subject of leaving the names of our great national heroes out of the histories used in the Portland schools.

The writer takes occasion to trace the attitude of the National Education Association on the subject of peace for the last ten years and finds reference made to it four times. Each time the association endorses moves for peace and takes a stand against Nationalism against Internationalism.

All of which is a fine thing. But Mr. Benham points out that the teachers of the world are trying to establish the brotherhood of man in a short space of time while the teachings of Jesus Christ have not been able to accomplish the purpose in over two thousand years.

Pointing to France as an example, Mr. Benham refers to their feeling of smug safety and self-satisfaction prior to 1870, and to the sudden realization to which they were brought by their lesson at Sedan. They were rudely awakened to the fact that a strong national spirit must be developed, and from that time on every French boy was taught that in war and in peace his first duty is to his country. He was taught to love the Third Republic, standing as it does for liberty, equality and fraternity, and that since he must resist at the peril of his life, if necessary, any aggression against it, it was his duty to submit to compulsory military training, so as to be prepared for that event.

It is in the public schools, during tender ages, that patriotism, the love of country and respect for the flag that protects our homes and national life is best taught. And this is best done, as Mr. Benham states, by the right kind of suggestion. To pass up Washington, Lincoln, and McKinley with mere mention, and to overlook their services to the country, as well as to insult the memory of Grant, Herkimer, Stark, and many others, without comment, is not only depriving the young student of the thrill that adds interest to the study but is decidedly a step in the wrong direction. Internationalism is a great thing, and most civilized people are longing for the time when the brotherhood of man is so firmly entrenched around the world that there will be no jealous striving for more power and territory. But until that time comes Nationalism is a greater thing, and the inculcation of the spirit of home protection and the protection of our national honor in Young America will no doubt continue.

The National Education Association now in session has an opportunity to do better service in this respect this year, and many are watching to see what stand they take at this meeting.

#### THE ALBANY ROUND-UP

In two years' time the little band of enterprising business men has succeeded in establishing an institution that is doing the city more good and at the same time giving the visitor within our gates more real value for the dollar he spends than anything heretofore attempted. And it has been done with less fuss and worry than one department of the ordinary fair generally occasions.

Then here we have something that is worth maintaining. It brings brings great crowds to the city and amply repays them for their trouble and expense. It attracts visitors from a distance who shop and spend their money with local merchants. It puts life into the city and stirs up any feeling of lethargy that might settle down upon an inactive center.

So why not let the entire city

enter whole-heartedly into the affair and make its burdens more general? While the success of the round-up is guaranteed by about 70 stockholders, the actual work falls upon some six or eight men. More co-operation is needed.

Now is the time to begin for next year. There were many lessons learned in this year's round-up. In the first place, Albany is charmingly located for a big event, being in the center of population between Salem and Roseburg and situated well for drawing large crowds out of Portland, as was done this year. The present seating arrangements are entirely inadequate. Better care must be given visitors to the city. This year no less than 200 men slept in the Round-Up grandstand. In the hotels they lodged in chairs, on floors, and some walked the streets. An accommodation bureau to list every available room in the city and direct people to places of lodging is necessary.


No one could find fault with the department of the city during the Round-Up, not an arrest being made, and the entire event was a success in every particular. But let us all be better prepared for next year, and let us all begin thinking about it now.
