**THE MODISH TOUCH**

"Let me take one of your bundles. I used to feel chagrined if I were seen carrying anything, but now I don't feel dressed without a package."  
 This bit overheard is typical of the new attitude. Mr. Hoover has made it fashionable to eat the leaf of lettuce on which salad reposed, once left for some mysterious feminine unreason. And the Council of National Defense is making it "vogue to the last detail" to carry home one's purchases, be they gloves, goobers or tubers.  
 Reorganization of the entire retail delivery system is proposed. The wastefulness by which a woman has a pair of shoes delivered by one large wagon with no other errands in her block, a box of hosiery by a huge motor truck later, her table linen by another, the children's underwear by another, has been one of the crying sins.  
 It's not the woman's fault. The fatigue of toting a number of small articles from place to place would be a serious factor in her day. Neither is she to be blamed for the fact that the shoe store does not carry hosiery, or that the department store where she bought the rest of her things chooses to make a separate delivery for each.  
 Nor is it her fault that six butchers deliver separately on her street, three milkmen in turn disturb the morning slumbers of her neighborhood.  
 A general delivery system for all stores would release at least half the labor, equipment and gasoline for more serious purposes.  
 No woman is expected, even by the Council of Defense, to carry home ten small parcels at once, nor a box of "swelling" nor a bushel of potatoes. Her energy is worth far more in other ways, and that is what delivery systems are for.  
 But she can urge upon all her trades men the wisdom of co-operation in deliveries, and she can carry the trifles that would go in her shopping bag or a smart basket. Why should not a sensible idea supply that modish touch?

**DISPITS**

 For a city 458.5 miles from Albany, Spokane does pretty well in having a fine contingent of former Albany people as residents, prominent in the activities of the city.

On arriving here Tuesday morning in order to get my bearings in reference to the ways and highways of the city I hunted up a couple of old Albany friends, and they put me on the right track so that locations have been easy and expeditious.  
 The first seen was W. J. Ortel, who captured one of Albany's finest girls about nineteen years ago, Miss Nina Parker, and skipped out soon after for Spokane, where they stand high. Mr. Ortel is treasurer-manager of the Shaw-Borden Company, a big office supply establishment, with a commercial printing office and a film development department. The last alone takes care of about a thousand different films a day, covering approximately twelve thousand prints. An interesting fact is that a 11 orders placed before 11 o'clock are filled by 5 o'clock. Mr. Ortel took me up on top of the Old National Bank building, the finest commercial building here, fifteen stories high, giving me an opportunity to get a splendid bird's-eye view of the city, impressing one with the city, its bigness (122,000) and its possibilities.

That Old in connection with the bank is used to give an appearance of stability to the bank, which it has. It's banking offices and lobby are the finest I have seen in the Northwest.

The next former Albanian seen was Thomas J. Overman, who with Mrs. Overman, left Albany twenty-three years ago, and have never been back since. Fine people. The former Albanians seen by me were Roy and Ray Beeson, who are making good decidedly. They run the biggest garage in the city with the Ford agency, and also have the R. M. Wade business here. Their garage is run day and night and they have twenty-eight men on their payroll. Press B. Marshall, father-in-law of Roy, is bookkeeper at the garage and his two sons, Fred and Arthur, are working in the shop during the vacation season.

Then I had the pleasure of taking dinner at the home of R. M. Robertson, also meeting Mrs. Robertson and Miss Lilly, former Albany people, residents here with a summer residence at Spirit Lake, for many years. They left the next morning in their Mitchell for a visit at Albany, where they will be the guests of Miss Elizabeth Irvine, and they can tell you the rest.

Alex Rennie, a former Albany boy, amateur base ball player, 20 years ago, travels out of here for Fleischer & Mayer.

Mrs. Eva Cowan Meikle and family continue to make their home here, though Mrs. Cowan and children are out of the city. Met Mr. Meikle, assistant secretary of the Spokane Merchants Association. Mrs. Cowan, when a girl rather slim, is now quite large, and her friends say is about the best natured woman in the United States, happy and jolly.
