HINSON SCORES KAISER

(Continued from Page One)

Europe and landed at Plymouth, Mass., to establish a government of political and religious liberty. "In 1776," he said, "God wrote the word 'Independence' in American skies. In those days the shot was fired that was heard round the world ever since, and which Germany will hear in 1917. "I would like to put the spirit of 1776 against the slacker of 1917." Dr. Hinson is from a family of military men, and while he is not for war, he is for humanity and the brotherhood of man at all times, and is willing to fight for it if necessary. He denounced the Kaiser as "the millionaire murderer," and told of some of the things that he will have to answer for at the close of this war.

"The Spanish war revealed the unity of this country, sons from the North and South fighting side by side. And in the present war they are doing the same thing. We are all Americans. There is no North, South, East or West; there is no party, no creed or sect, in this trouble. We are a country united, and all of us Americans.

"The year 1917 will be regarded by our grandchildren as a memorable year in American history. The only mistake that this country made was in not entering the war when Ger-

man troops set foot on Belgian soil.

This country has ever stood for the rights of humanity the moment those brave people were violated this government should have stepped in. We waited as long as we could. Germany was given every chance to do the right thing, but did not do it. "I am a republican and have always voted the Republican ticket, but if I were called upon tomorrow to express by approval or disapproval of the President, I would feel it an honor to cast my first Democratic vote for President Wilson. There are no parties now, and any man who cannot support President Wilson ought to cross the Atlantic.

We remained out of this war as long as possible. Any country that does not stand up for its citizens is a country disgraced. A country that does not stand up for humanity is no country at all. "If every state in the union had come to the front in proportion as Oregon has with men for the army there would have been no conscription. I am proud of Oregon for the way she over-subscribed the liberty bonds and the Red Cross fund, and then furnished more than the quota of men. I believe that the spirit of 1620 is in this movement and that the spirit of 1776 is still alive."

Dr. Hinson roared the I. W. W., stating that America owes this class of people nothing. He said that America has furnished them a good place to live in with plenty of opportunities to make a good living, but that they must make it themselves. This country will not stand for a crowd of lawless men burning fields of grain, factories, mills and destroying property just because they think they have a grievance.

Nor are all the men I. W. W. who are hoboes. There are others. Any man who holds back food supplies, materials for munitions or any other commodity that is needed in this war as much of an I. W. W. as any
