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HOG GROWERS' ASSOCIATIONS

An item in the Railroad Red Book tells of a unique organization of hog growers in the San Luis Valley, Colorado. Animal diseases, particularly hog cholera, had been working great financial loss to stock raisers of that region.

So they formed a hog growers' association with about 300 members. The annual dues for every member are \$12. At a salary of \$2400 a year, the association employs a veterinary surgeon whose job it is to look after the welfare of the stock of members of the organization, attending the sanitation, disease control, etc.

Other localities in Colorado now have similar organizations. Prosperity follows such sensible and wholehearted co-operation. Farmer and stock raiser have learned that lesson as well as their neighbor, the city business man.
