TRIP EAST IS TOLD BY LUPER

getting off the boat and registering (was assigned a room mate and room in a cottage or tent. There are 25 cottages and as many tents. The dining hall, administration building, chapel, and headquarters are the main buildings.

A leader is placed over each cottage or tent, usually about eight boys. The total number of boys are divided up into six Indian tribes, each tribe wearing different colored head bands. They are to play against other tribes in the following games: tennis, volleyball, basketball, hockey, golf, baseball and water polo. Before the finish of the camp each boy in every tribe will have played each, and the champions from each tribe will play against the other for the grand tribal reward. They are also divided into nine groups in order that each class will not be so large.

In the morning at 6:45 a. m., the bell rings and every boy is up and in his bathing suit in five minutes, and lined up outside in eight rows. All salute and sing "Star Spangled Banner," while the flag is being raised. After this we have exercises and then jump into the lake. This is the process of the morning's dip. The bell rings for breakfast at seven thirty. Every boy has a meal card and a class card. These cards are punched at each meal and class. If you are late it is punched on the reverse side and counted against you. At 8:30 a. m., a class on "Four-Fold Life" is conducted by John L. Alexander. At 9:10 a. m., a class on woodcraft, by E. Brooks, 9:50 class on Sunday school plans, 1, by Mr. Blackburn; 10:30 swimming lessons for those who do not know how. Then

at 11:10 assembly and chapel. Several boys have a chance to talk at each chapel. 12:30 p. m. the bell rings for dinner.

About three hundred are at each meal, with the leaders and their wives. Every meal is accompanied by yells and songs from different tables and tribes. Recreation until 2 p. m. then report at headquarters for military drill under regular army officers.

We are to visit the Highland Park Military Academy under Colonel Davidson, where they have trenches and regular war instruments. Here we will get some idea of the real thing. At 3 p. m., games for certain tribes and from 4 to 5 swimming races, and water races. 5:30, supper, then at 7 p. m., is the Hillside service songs and lectures.

After this service we go to the Council Circle or amphitheatre, a large bonfire is built in the center of the circle, and the boys are seated in accordance to their tribal relations. This is the place where all the fun and comedies are presented by different boys and tribes.

After returning to the cottage the boys and the leaders have devotions, and then to bed. Every light is supposed to be out when the bell rings at 10 p. m. Each boy is under discipline from the time he arrives until he leaves, and each is given a large questionnaire blank to fill out. After you have filled this out, the headquarters staff make a chart and shows just where you stand physically, religiously, mentally and socially.

Every boy must take notes on each class and hand his note book in at the end of the two weeks. Then he is graded on same. It is a three-year's course to graduate.
