CITY NEWS

Conducts Swimming Hole—

E. A. Baldwin, who lives nine miles east of Albany on the Knox Butte Road, conducts a swimming hole, known as the Old Reliable Swimming Hole. The place is near the Copeland Saw Mill. Mr. Baldwin reports that large crowds bathe every day at this place in the Santiam, and that many people come out from Albany. Mr. Baldwin has put up a refreshment stand and sells ice cream, etc., to the bathers. A camp ground is also handy, for which a small fee is charged, and many people go out for a night or two or over the weekend and spend the time in the open.

Budge Stewart Numbered—

Ralph "Budge" Stewart, son of Postmaster C. H. Stewart, of this city, will be in the first draft of men sent to the new army from Sheridan county, Montana. The Poplar Standard gives the names of the first numbers drawn in that county, and Stewart is given as 27th on the list. There will be 742 taken from that county.

PENLETON ROUND-UP BIGGER THAN EVER

Penleton, Ore., July 31.—Fifty thousand dollars will be expended by Penleton in putting on the 1917 Round-Up, September 20, 21 and 22, which insures the very best in contests, horses, steers, performers and contests worth seeing. Special Pullman trains have already been engaged and will come from Portland, Spokane and St. Paul. The attendance will be equal to if not greater than 1916. The railroads have granted the usual special rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip from all points in the Northwest. The railroad officials assure the management there will be no falling off in attendance and the only question with them is whether or not they will be able to furnish the equipment.

CAR OF LADDERS WILL BE SHIPPED TONIGHT

The first full car of ladders ever shipped out of Albany will leave here this week over the Oregon Electric lines for northern Washington points. The shipment is being made by the Far West Sales Company, whose factory is in the Cameron Planing Mill. Stacks of ladders, 150 of them, are included in the shipment. They were made especially for the apple growers near Okanogan, Wash., and are from 14 to 16 feet long each. The ladders would make a string 2250 feet high and are valued at nearly \$1000. The company employs about 25 men and has many orders on hand.

OVERHEATED BATTERIES

There are two ways to test overheating in the battery; an exact test with a thermometer, and an approximate test by placing the tips of the fingers on the battery top connections.

Overheating is particularly liable to happen when you are touring running long distances at fairly high rates of speed and giving the battery little or no use. In other words when you are overfeeding your battery.

The only way to guard against this condition is to test the temperature of the battery at frequent intervals. If you find the connections more than blood warm to the touch or the thermometer registering 100 degrees or above, you should turn on all the lights and keep them burning as long as the machine is running. By doing this you divert part of the energy that the generator is creating, from the battery to the lights. If overheating is detected, examination should immediately be made to make sure that all cells have sufficient water.

The only way to detect symptoms of trouble in the battery is to watch the battery carefully. The gravity of all cells should be tested once a week with the hydrometer syringe; and filled with distilled water, if needed, at the same time.

The hydrometer syringe is the one best way of telling exactly what your battery is doing. If you make this test regularly you will nip the trouble in the bud and of course be amply repaid by the fact that your battery is always on the job.

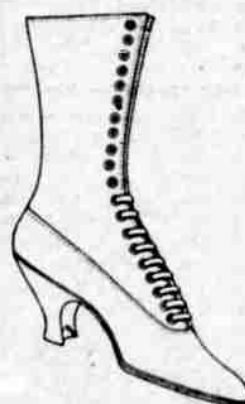
