

NEW BILL WILL RAISE MILLIONS

Increase of Hundred and Forty Millions Over Bill Passed by House in May

INCOMES WILL BEAR BIG SHARE OF BURDEN

Newspaper Profits and Second Class Postage Hit; Other Sources of Revenue

Washington, Aug. 6.—Senator Simmons, chairman of the Finance committee presented Senate Committee's report on the revenue bill, which proposes to raise more than two billion dollars.

Washington, Aug. 6.—This is an increase of one hundred and forty million over the bill the House passed last May.

The revenue will come from the income tax on war profits, liquor tobacco, freight, parcelpost, express, transportation, telegraph and telephone messages.

Three million dollars will be raised from second class postage and seven and a half million from a profit tax on news papers.

The largest increase is seven hundred seventy seven million on income taxes.

THREE DEAD IN IDAHO AUTO ACCIDENT

Payette, Idaho, Aug. 6.—Three are dead and three were injured two probably fatally, as a result of an automobile accident between Payette and Woodspur this morning.

The dead are Frank Hon, a stockman, of Council, Idaho, Mrs. Hon and son, Frank, aged twenty-five. Another son and two daughters were injured.

A local passenger train struck the automobile.

NINETEEN MEMBERS OF FIFTH COMPANY RETURN

Honorable Discharge Given Men, Who Are Sorry to Leave Service of U.S. Government

Albany boys returning from Fort Stevens, where they were rejected by army medical officers on account of various defects, report upon conditions existing at the barracks. Practically every one of the boys are disappointed over their discharge. It is said that some were even angry at the officers when they were rejected. Of the 19 sent home, all but about four had flat feet. The examinations were very stringent. One or two members of the company tried to evade the requirement and get discharged, but they were given it harder than any of the others and were kept on deck.

Those who received honorable discharge for physical disqualification, were Mess Sergeant A. L. Briggs, Sergeants Chas. N. Erwin, Arthur Parsons, Bugler Carlton Logan, Corporals Clay Kirk, Frank Bussard, Cook Charles Barrett, privates Hans Plagman, Mery Bilyen, Wilbur Bruckman, Chester Crouch, Forrest Eaton, Miller Hayden of Salem, Hugh Jones, Tangent, Virgil Peacock, Harold Smith, Joseph Stoneburg, Jay Willard and Robert D. Evans. Eight others who were rejected on the first examinations were given another examination upon the protest of the officers of the company and reinstated. There were 13 men transferred to the 9th and 11th companies, which leaves 85 men now in the Fifth Company. It left Albany with 127 men. The required strength is 109.

The report published Saturday regarding Captain Knox's promotion to be Major of the battalion going to Ft. Canby is verified by the men returning. It is also said that Lieutenant A. C. Baker has been made Captain while a new man from the outside has been placed in the First Lieutenant's position. He is said to be a fine fellow and popular with the men. Second Lieutenant Clarence Collins remains in his command, as does top sergeant George B. Crawford.

Privates Paul Dawson and John Lamb have been named company cooks, and are now learning that art.

There is no drill from noon on Saturdays until Sunday evening, and all members of the company have that time off to visit Astoria, Seaside, and other resorts. The fort is located about two miles from the sea, and the surf sounds plainly in the barracks. The men take a plunge in the surf every afternoon.

The boys are comfortably located in the barracks. There are tables and other conveniences. They play baseball, football and other games and have a good time at all hours. The food is fair and no complaint is heard as to quality. However, the boys state that they are glad that they have a mess fund to draw to when things get monotonous.

It was not definitely known by those returning, but it was thought that Fifth Company would move to Fort Canby today or Tuesday.

NAVAL MILITIA MEN WILL LEAVE WEDNESDAY

In all probability the Albany boys who joined the Naval Militia in Portland last week will leave for Seattle Wednesday to begin their training. Among those who will go from here are Howard Speer and Floyd Shortridge, apprentice seamen; Edwin Fortmiller, Bert Stevens, Kenneth Stevens, Royal Thomas and Henry Fish, musicians.

The boys will go into training at the camp, which is located on the University of Washington grounds. The Naval Militia will do coast defense duty during the period of the war, the regular navy being called on for service in foreign waters.

Yes, he has gone. With his two weeks vacation over, F. R. Gouldstone, a member of the motorcycle brigade of the Portland police force, has packed his grip, bid goodbye to Recorder Levelling, Chief Catlin and Grant Pirtle, at whose place he hung out when not chasing speed bugs, and returned to his regular job.

For the past two weeks Gouldstone has been the terror of the motorists of this city, and many a tourist found to his sorrow that the city streets were not speedways.

During his 12 days service Gouldstone made nine arrests for which fines amounting to \$85 were collected. He was employed at a salary of \$5 a day and received \$60, leaving a net profit to the city of \$25. He also left an impression with many automobile owners who were inclined to speed, and others caught at the same time will still be dealt with. Gouldstone was really a better sort of a fellow than those arrested gave him credit for being, and did his duty as he saw it.

GREY WOLF KILLED BY LACOMB MAN SATURDAY

Hungry Brute Chased Deer Within 150 Yards of House; Wolf Brings \$25 Bounty

Charles Clark brought the carcass of a large grey wolf to the city Saturday afternoon, which he killed that morning near his place on Crabtree Creek above Lacombe.

The wolf, although a large one, was so poor that it weighed only 60 lbs. Hunger had brought it near civilization, and in chasing a deer it came within 150 yards of Mr. Clark's house. The deer came so close that Mr. Clark could see the marks on its hind legs where the wolf had bitten it in an effort to run it down.

The wolf brought Mr. Clark a bounty of \$25, after which he put the beast into the hands of a taxidermist to have it mounted.

The reports have gone out that many deer have been killed by dogs, but Mr. Clark is of the opinion that wolves and not dogs have been doing practically all of the damage.

REJECTED OFFICERS PASS THROUGH ALBANY

Approximately 100 men from the Reserve Officers' Training Camp at the Presidio of San Francisco, passed through Albany bound for northern points this morning. Two hundred men composing the Masonic Ambulance Corps, organized in California for service in France also were aboard the train. The latter contingent was on its way to a concentration point in Washington.

Members of the Reserve Officers' Training Camp, where a number of Albany young men have been in training for the last three months, said that now the camp was practically over, and that the recommendations of the regular army officials as to those qualified to receive commissions were on their way to Washington for final action by the War Department.

Just how many men will receive commissions as officers in the National Army is as yet unknown, but from indications, men who passed through here today, said probably 1000 men out of the 3000 who started training would be passed.

So far as known, all of the Albany men trying for commissions in the Officers' Reserve Corps have made good, but nothing definite will be known until the decisions of the Washington authorities are announced. It was said by the men who passed through Albany this morning that an early announcement to the successful applicants for commissions was expected.

Members of the Training camp who were unsuccessful in receiving commissions declared that it was anticipated when they left the Presidio that more commissions would later be issued, and the need for trained officers became more apparent, and that in such case, those not commissioned in the first instance, who had done good work while in camp, would be rewarded.

SUBMARINE SCARE IN NEW YORK CITY

Passengers and Crew on Merchant Ship See Submarine Five Thousand Feet Away

GUNS TRAINED AND LIFE BELTS ORDERED

Federal Officials Close Port of New York as Precautionary Measure

New York, Aug. 6.—The Port of New York was closed today after a steamer arrived and reported sighting a strange submarine some distance outside. This action was taken as a precautionary measure, the navy department announced this afternoon.

Passengers arriving in New York reported seeing a periscope some five thousand feet away. They donned life belts and the guns were trained on the object which quickly disappeared.

AGED BLIND MAN INJURED BY FALL

W. C. Breckenridge Suffers Broken Hip in Fall from Porch This Morning

W. C. Breckenridge was seriously injured at 11 o'clock this morning when he walked off of the porch of the F. P. Nutting house at Fifth and Washington streets. His hip was broken and he is suffering from bruises and the shock.

Mr. Breckenridge, who is 74 years old, has been blind for the past 13 years. He has been able to get around by himself remarkably well and did not have to depend upon anyone for assistance. This morning he went to the front door to get the mail and in some manner walked too near the edge of the porch and fell off.

His call was heard by Mrs. W. H. Holman, a neighbor, and by F. L. Hammerly, who was passing. He was taken into the house, his daughters notified and Dr. B. R. Wallace was called. He is still suffering greatly from the injury and it is not possible to tell what effect it will have.

Mr. Breckenridge has been under the care of his daughters, Miss Sue Breckenridge and Mrs. Alma Brandshagen, and recently moved into the house vacated by Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Nutting.

THREE DEAD IN DRAFT RIOTS

"Shoot Every Man Who Wears White Shirt" Is Command Given by I.W.W. Leaders

STRIKE THREATS HAUNT BUTTE BUSINESS MEN

Clerks May Walk Out; All Branches of Industry May Be Affected by Agitation

Holdenville, Okla., Aug. 6.—"Shoot every man who wears a white shirt," were the orders of the anti-draft rioters, captured members told the posse today. A special train with fifty-six captured members of the so-called working class union were taken to McAlester today, thus far three are dead and several are wounded as a result of the riots. Poses cleared most of the sections of rioters.

Butte Situation
Butte, Aug. 6.—Several additional strikes threaten to completely tie up Butte industries as a result of the sentiment aroused over the lynching of Little.

The clerks' union takes a strike vote tonight. The street car company is not attempting to break the strike. No cars have been moved since Saturday morning.

Open opposition to the draft added complications to the situation here. The authorities feared trouble when the examinations begin Thursday. Electricians on Electrical division of the Milwaukee railroad served a thirty days strike notice on the company.

Trouble in Wyoming
Shawnee, Aug. 6.—It is reported that the draft resisters are dynamiting and burning south of Shawnee. A special train with a posse of twenty-five left here for Romulus where serious trouble is reported.

HOME GUARD TO MEET AT ARMORY AT 8:00 TONIGHT

Captain W. G. Ballack of the Linn County Home Guard company, has called a meeting of that organization to be held in the armory at 8 o'clock this evening. The meeting is important and all members are urged to be present. Also, all persons who wish to become members are urged to be present. Those who do not belong to the company or who do not come to join are asked not to attend. Only members will be admitted to the meeting after it takes up.

There are at present over 150 members in the Home Guards. More are wanted. Those wishing to join to be in reserve for the protection of life and property in this vicinity should be on hand at the armory early tonight.
