GERMAN COLONISTS

Commenting on the plea that Germany "must retain her colonies in Africa, and some sphere of influence in Asia," in order to provide relief for her overflowing population, the New York Times gives some interesting and little-known facts.

Germany's African colonies, now in the hands of her enemies, aggregate about 1,000,000 square miles, and include some of the best lands on the continent. To what extent were they utilized before the war, to drain off the overflow of the German Empire and provide opportunity for enterprising Teuton pioneers? Will, in the five years 1907-1911 inclusive, the total emigration from Germany to Africa amounted to 130 people.

And how many Germans have overflowed into the Teuton sphere of influence in Asia during those five years? Exactly one.

In the same period more than 110,000 Germans came to the United States.

The year before the war began, there were altogether, in German colonies throughout the world, only 24,000 whites, and they were nearly all soldiers and office-holders.

The German government may have its own ideas about the desirability of colonial expansion, but the German nation has sedulously refrained from expanding into the space provided for it. While the Kaiser and his empire-builders were seeking their much-advertised "place in the sun" in Africa and Asia and the islands of the sea, their people were finding it in America.

The Germans have never been a colonizing race. Given colonies, they have refused to live in them and do the rough pioneer work that is so congenial to Englishmen and Americans. They are pioneers in business, but not in developing natural resources. Will it be any different after the war?

NEWS NOTES OF INTEREST TO BUSY OREGON PEOPLE

Oregon Grape Not Guilty—Some Fellowship—O. A. C. "Distinguishing"—Data on Irrigation

The campaign to exterminate ruthlessly all barbaries, of which the Oregon grape, the state flower, is a variety, which bear certain grain smuts that waste vast quantities of wheat and other cereals, will not include the Oregon grape because it does not aid in carrying the cereal smuts over winter. The Federal and O. A. C. cereal disease specialists which met recently have pledged themselves to work for the eradication of all barbaries that carry the preventable smuts.

A payment of \$2500 a year for one, two or three years is offered by the Research Corporation of New York, to any young man who can submit satisfactory evidence of scientific attainments, discoveries or inventions. The terms stated in a letter to the Oregon Agricultural College say that \$300 will be paid on award of the scholarship and \$200 monthly thereafter. Applicants must submit evidence of accomplishments in a specified field and name the field in which they pledge themselves to work. Application blanks may be had on request to the office, 63 Wall Street.

The distinguished rank has been conferred on the Oregon Agricultural College by the United States War Department, for excellence in military training. Of the 122 educational institutions in the entire country entitled to the rating only 15 are awarded it each year. Aside from the honor it confers, it gives the President of the College and his assistants the right to name ten graduates of the 1917 class for commissions in the United States army with no further examination except the physical.

The most extensive potato irrigation experiments ever conducted in the United States, probably the whole world, are under way at the O. A. C. Experiment Station.

Left for Newport

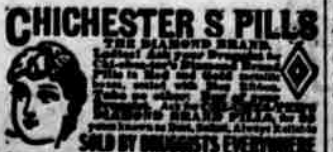
Mrs. M. McAlpin and daughter, Eudora, and Miss Hazel Earl, left on the noon train for Newport for a ten-days' outing.
