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PEACE TALK

German statesmen, raising a chorus of pleas for peace, find nowhere a friendly response with the possible exception of Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin. Their enemies are openly contemptuous. Neutrals close their ears.

What is the truth? Have the Allies, including ourselves, deliberately plotted to tear Germany to pieces? And has the rest of mankind turned callous?

The answer has been admirably given in an editorial in the New York Evening Post—a newspaper which will be the more readily credited in its explanation because it has, during the greater part of the past three years, been accused of over-friendliness to Germany.

Remarkable on the tremendous misfortunes now fallen on Germany—the impending exhaustion of her manpower, the threatened collapse of her finance, the failure of her food supply, the loss of her shipping and her commerce, the ruin of her industries, all potent reasons for her seeking peace—the Post suggests that, overwhelming as these evils appear, they are not the worst.

Germany has to mourn today a greater loss than of those mentioned. She has squandered her moral assets. At a time when she needs to call up all her reserves of good faith and confidence, she finds that they have been wasted.

"Nobody believes her. Nobody trusts her. Upon the German government that she is morally bankrupt is being pressed from every quarter.

This is the indisputable truth which stands out in the reception throughout the world of the latest peace proposals of Germany. They meet with almost universal scepticism and suspicion.

It is Germany herself that has taught the world to distrust her. A long course of lawlessness heaped upon duplicity, of brutality intermingled with deceit, has made every utterance of the German government suspect. Hence the amazing, the painful unanimity with which the public men and the press in all belligerent and neutral countries have looked upon the repeated peace offers of the German authorities as merely a snare for the unwary.

Whom are they trying to trick now? What new betrayal are they preparing? For what fresh burst of ferocity is this all a mask? Germany ostensibly holds out an olive branch, but prudent statesmen insist upon examining it to see if it does not conceal a dagger.

This is the fated and terrible punishment of Germany already beginning. She is reaping what she has sowed. Her rulers have brought the good name of the country into disrepute. Their promises no longer pass anywhere at their face value. This is the havoc which the German government, in three years, has made of the proud old tradition of 'Deutsche Treue.'

Today Germans look around the horizon and see nowhere a friend, nowhere a nation that will accept the bare pledge of the German government. Everywhere they perceive dislike and distrust. This is the moral punishment of Germany for her crimes, and it is not to be wondered at that many of her citizens are crying out that the punishment is greater than they can bear."

CHICAGO'S PENNANT CHANCES DEPEND ON HOME STAY

New York, August 13.—Beginning right now the White Sox will have to play the best ball they so far have displayed if they manage to get into the world's series.

Finishing the series with Cleveland they will go home for a stay until Sept. 3, when they play a double-header with Detroit. Then they hit the road for the rest of the season, with the exception of three days scheduled at home. They manage to slip in some postponed contests on off days in that period, but they will not be enough to count for much.

During the same period the White Sox are at home the Red Sox will be on their last big trip, although they are scheduled for a short swing later. Boston will finish the season at home, a fact which is a decided advantage for Jack Berry's men.

There still are left two clashes between the two clubs, one at Chicago and one at Boston. The latter may be the series that will decide the race for it will be played in the campaign's closing days, beginning Sept. 21 and including Sept. 24.

Every eastern club and two from the western wheel will visit Chicago in the home series they are about to start. Later they will entertain another of the westerners for a brief period.

The Red Sox should be favorites if the race sticks to anything like a close decision, for they are driving, nerveless finishers. They beat out the White Sox and the Tigers last year while crippled and while on the road. The Chicagoans are stronger this year, but they have yet to prove the consistency under stress of a tight windup.

Harry Greb of Pittsburg, is rapidly forging to the front as a logical man to meet Mike Gibbons. His recent defeat of Jack Dillon and subsequent brilliant performances give him an edge over any boxer now clamoring for a chance at Gibbons. Jeff Smith is still in the ring, but has, for the time being, ceased to be considered as a Gibbons opponent.

The return of Jimmy Clabby from Australia already reported, would give promoters a chance to get Gibbons back in action. A bout between this pair of speed merchants would be a real card.
