SELECTIVE SERVICE

VOLUNTEERS

Since Gen. Crowder issued his order, on Aug. 6, that willing aliens might be enrolled in our new national army, there has been a heart-warming response. Thousands of men from whom, but lately, we were expecting nothing, and against whom native and naturalized Americans felt a natural grievance because of their immunity, have come forward cheerfully.

The spirit shown by our immigrant population is proving an agreeable surprise to some of our more cynical citizens. They show an unexpected appreciation of the benefits they have received in this country, and of the principles at stake. They want to fight for American ideals and world-freedom.

These men are volunteers, as General Crowder has explained in much the same sense as citizens who joined the army of their own free will before the draft became operative. They are, as matters stand, under no liability to serve, and have full liberty to claim exemption. Every one who makes such claim is deserving of honor as an American patriot. Nearly all these volunteers may be expected as a matter of course, to take out their naturalization papers. At any rate, we hope they will. We want them as citizens.

Eventually large numbers of our alien residents may become subject to the draft, through treaty arrangement with the governments of their native lands. It is held, with reason enough, that immigrants from belligerent countries now allied with us, inasmuch as they would have to fight if they remained at home, should not be immune here. Immunity for them would mean an unwarranted abuse of our national hospitality. It would mean that the men who made this country what it is would be obliged to do all the fighting to preserve liberty and opportunity for late-comers unwilling to assume their obligation. Such a situation is intolerable, and will be remedied. Meanwhile, we are glad to extend the hand of fellowship to the willing recruits, and assure them of our gratitude.

LOGANBERRY IN CANADA

Victoria, B. C., August 14.—Victoria may get a loganberry juice factory. H. S. Gile, of the Pleasant Fruit Juice company of Salem, Ore., has been in close touch with industrial Commissioner Armstrong here for some time relative to the establishment of a plant.

The Oregon concern has shipped large quantities of loganberry products to Canada, paying a large import duty. The company now proposes to encourage loganberry growing on Vancouver Island and establish a plant in or near Victoria.

Loganberry juice is becoming exceedingly popular in the dominion.

LITTLE'S DEATH PUZZLES

Butte, Mont., August 14.—Either German agents or the I. W. W. killed Frank Little, lynched I. W. W. agitator.

This today was the remarkable statement of Secretary Edwards of the Montana Metal Trades council and one of the most prominent labor leaders in the state. Edwards has studied the Little killing carefully, but he is unable to choose between his two theories.

He finds motive a plenty for either theory. If German agents killed Little, their motive was to create further disturbance and increase I. W. W. activity. Butte produces one-fifth of the copper mined in the United States and, Edwards concludes, German agents would not stop at taking a life if they thought they could interfere with the production of this metal necessary in the manufacture of munitions.

On the other hand, Edwards finds there was a suspicion among certain industrialists that Little was a detective, working to secure secrets of the organization. If this theory is correct, Little paid for his deceit with his life.
