## **CASCADIA RESORT**

ATTRACTS E. E. LARIMORE

(From N. W. Hotel News)  
Portland, Ore., Aug. 8, 1917.—Mr.

F. W. Beach, Secretary Oregon State Hotel Association, Portland, Oregon.

—My dear Mr. Beach: As you know, I was delegated as a representative of the hotels on a recent trip to Portland business men in connection with Government representatives to endeavor to have the Forestry Service use Government funds at their disposal to match state funds in the making and improving of the road known as the South Santiam pass over the mountains via Cascadia, Clear and Fish Lakes, on to Bend and eventually connecting with the Columbia Highway, thus forming a loop of some 400 miles of good roads, and making one of the best scenic and commercial roads in the entire state of Oregon. Through the columns of your paper I desire to make my report to the hotel association, and also to try and impress the hotelmen of Oregon of the importance of getting behind this movement and pushing it to a successful completion.

Our party left Portland on Friday, August 3, at 4:15 p. m. We arrived at Lebanon about 7:30, where we were met by a committee of Lebanon business men and escorted to the Hotel Lebanon. Here we found a most genial host in the person of Mr. Albert F. Wilson, who is running one of the finest hotels outside of Portland it has been our lot to see. At Lebanon we were joined by other business men from Albany, Brownsville, Salem and Scio. A most sumptuous banquet was spread, and to say that at that banquet was a "feast of reason and flow of soul" would be putting it mildly. Brother Wilson and the good people of Lebanon certainly know how to entertain. After the banquet we all went to the hall, where a dance was in progress for the benefit of the Red Cross Society, and of course, we all danced.

Saturday morning at 8 o'clock we started in autos for the trip over the mountains, and about 10:30 a. m. pulled into Cascadia. Here we also found most genial hosts in the persons of Mr. and Mrs. Geisenlof, who operate the Hotel Cascadia. Cascadia itself is the most wonderful spot I have ever visited, far none, and the possibilities of that resort on the completion of a good road is simply beyond the wildest imagination.

In the evening we had a big bonfire and held a chautauqua and good roads meeting in the grove in front of the hotel, right on the bank of the roaring Santiam.

Much good will came of this trip, as the consensus of opinion among all of the party, as well as of the Government and county officials, was that this road should and must be built and improved, and when this is done it will open to the people of Portland one of the finest scenic districts in the State of Oregon. It will also be of the very greatest advantage in a commercial sense, for it will open up Eastern Oregon and give us direct communication therewith, which means more than we can now contemplate.

The one thing which struck me most forcibly on this trip was the woeful ignorance on the part of our own people as to what we have right at our own doors to attract both the tourist and the investor and home-builder.

The hotel association should get soul and body behind this movement and show the people of that district that we are a broad-minded, progressive and awake to the best interests of the entire state. We should come out of our shell and realize that the upbuilding of these outlying districts through the office of good roads means a greater Oregon, a better and more prosperous Portland. Our interests are mutual with these good people of Albany, Lebanon, Brownsville. They are willing and are doing all they can to build up this district, and the least we of Portland can do is to put our shoulder to the wheel and show them that our interests are mutual, and that we will aid them in every way possible to accomplish their desire in this matter.
