84 books were taken out of the Library last Saturday.

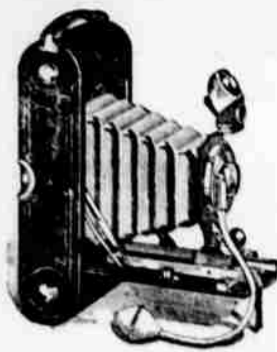
A number of books may be found for those who wish to become naturalized citizens of the United States.

Fossler of Portland, "School Libraries Instruction in Use of Books in Grades and high schools," by Ruth Paxton, and "Librarians and Inspectors" by Mrs. Ida Kidder, Librarian of the Oregon Agricultural College. A special session for the Library Trustees is scheduled for Tuesday, the third, at which time Judson T. Jennings of Seattle, will talk on the "Financing the Public Library." A short discussion on the model library will be led by Mrs. R. K. Page, trustee of the Salem Library.

OFFICIAL NOTICE

Ordinance regulating the driving of stock through the public streets and alleys of the City of Albany, Oregon:

It is unlawful for any person or persons to drive any loose stock through any public street or alley within the City of Albany, Oregon, except provided as follows:

Stock coming across steel bridge from Benton County, must go south out Calipoola street to County Road.

Stock coming on Salem or Santiam road must go south on Geary street to County Road.

Stock going to Benton County crossing steel bridge must come on County Road to south end of Calipoola street to steel bridge.
