"A POP AT THE KAISER"

"If I could be sure of getting a pop at the Kaiser, I'd pack my trunk and sail today," remarked one man being examined for the national army. Not being sure of accomplishing that ambition, he wanted draft officials to take care of his wife while he was in training.

A great many of the boys going to France are animated by the same hope. The vision of shooting off the spiked helmet made familiar by innumerable cartoons is a characteristically American ideal. It symbolizes individualism and democracy both. But, after all, just as "any American boy may grow up to be President of the United States" but only one in every four years is going to reach that exalted station, so only one, or at most a handful, of boys who may be American or may be any one of half a dozen nations now surrounding the borders of the fatherland can attain the picturesque ideal of killing or capturing the Prussian Wilhelm.

Yet, just as the "any boy may be President" ideal is an extremely effective one on which to raise a generation of citizens, each of whom may serve just as usefully in his place as the one who occupies the most conspicuous position, just so the object of "popping" the Kaiser is useful all round when translated into slightly more formal terms.

For every citizen who does his utmost in his present job, and does a little extra for his country, every citizen who exercises a higher degree than usual of thoughtfulness and self-control about the activities of his ordinary life, is doing his share to dethrone the Hohenzollern dynasty.

NOTICE

Official warning to Motor Vehicle Drivers in the City of Albany, Or. Section 2.—It is unlawful to park any motor vehicle within ten feet of any fire hydrant in the City of Albany, or so as to obstruct any street crossing for pedestrians.

Section 3.—A motor vehicle overtaking any other vehicle traveling in the same direction, before passing the same shall give a signal by one blast or stroke of a horn, bell whistle, gong or other signalling device, and the driver of any motor vehicle about to turn either from a standstill or while in motion, shall give timely signal by outstretched hand or in some other unmistakable manner, indicate the direction of the turn. The driver of a motor vehicle, before backing shall give warning by three blasts of a horn, bell whistle, gong or other signalling device, and in stopping shall give timely warning to those behind by signalling with the hand or in some other unmistakable manner indicating the intention to stop.

No motor vehicle shall overtake any other vehicle traveling in the same direction upon street intersections.

Section 4.—No operator of any motor vehicle shall use any acetylene, electric or other head light unless it shall be so shaded as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon. The head lights of every motor vehicle shall be capable of throwing sufficient light ahead to reveal any person, vehicle or substantial object upon the roadway straight ahead of such motor vehicle at a distance of at least one hundred (100) feet.

Section 5.—No person shall ride or trespass upon any vehicle without the consent of the driver, nor shall any person riding upon any vehicle, sled or other conveyance hitch or hold on to any part of any other vehicle, street or interurban car without the consent of the driver thereof.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to

drive or cause to be driven any motor vehicle on any street, alley, or other public way within the corporate limits of the City of Albany, Ore., at a greater rate of speed than fifteen miles an hour, and at no time at a greater rate of speed than is reasonable, having regard to the safety of the public, the traffic and the use of the street then being traveled.

No motor vehicle shall be driven upon or alongside any street, alley or public way in said city unless the person acting as the operator thereof and as such operator controls the means of propulsions of any such motor vehicle shall be a person who is at least sixteen years of age.

And no motor vehicle shall be driven on the streets, alleys, or other public way within the City by any person unable or incapable to properly control the same with regard to safety of the public and other vehicles, that in all cases any person in a state of intoxication is conclusively deemed incapable and unable to operate and control the same.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof before the Recorder's Court shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars, nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) or by imprisonment in the City Jail for not less than five nor more than ten days.

The City Council will see that all these ordinances are strictly enforced.
