ARMY OFFICERS' CLOTHES

Army officers feel the pinch of high prices no less than their civilian brethren. Their salaries—never large considering the responsibility of their jobs and the position they are obliged to maintain—have not risen with the rising cost of the things they have to pay for out of their salaries. Thousands of the men now being graduated from officers' training camps are having difficulty in making both ends meet. Unlike privates, they have to provide their own uniforms and equipment. They can buy the necessary things, or they can support families in a modest way, but they can't very well do both on salaries ranging from \$1,700 a year for second lieutenant to \$2,400 for captain and \$3,000 for major.

The prices asked for officers' uniforms, consisting of coat and breeches, run as high as \$150. Overcoats can be bought as low as \$45 apiece, but good ones cost \$75 or \$100. Ready-made uniforms—frowned on in the service—are selling at \$30 to \$60, and ready-made overcoats at \$45 to \$75. All these prices have risen greatly in the last few months. The cost of shoes, too, has doubled, and pigskin puttees have jumped from \$5 to \$14. All these are the prices of private dealers. They are admittedly far higher than the cost of making such equipment. With all the government manufacturing, merchandising, and price-fixing that is going on, why should the government let profiteers gouge the army officers? Why does not the war department itself provide the necessary articles at cost?

How one German-American—he spells German with a little g and American with a capital A—feels about Germany is shown in the following letter to the editor of the Sioux City (Iowa) Journal:

"I have seen several articles in the Journal about Germans trying to raise strife in this country. I am a German by birth but I am an American by heart and hand. I will tell you why I left Germany. There were ten in our family and we were poor like the most of my countrymen who came to the good old United States of America to get away from oppression and it was a hard matter to keep the wolf from the door at times. When I landed in this country I secured work at once and received more money for one month's work than I got in Germany for one year's work. I sent for my folks and I am proud that they are all true American citizens and will answer the President's call to arms against Germany, or any other country when needed.

"I don't see how my countrymen can go back on Uncle Sam. They are here without a cent and made money here; now they want to fight the country that feeds them. The Kaiser never did anything for them or for me. If he did we would be there yet. All he did was to start this cruel war and starve all our people there, and make soldiers out of everybody, and force them to work for his dirty 12 a day, with a fourth of a pound of meat and a loaf of black bread. I hope to see the day when he is kicked out of Germany and a president put in his place.

"You don't see any Americans going over there for jobs or to any other nation. They are happy here and don't owe any allegiance to any king or Kaiser.

"I hope Uncle Sam will win. Hurrah for President Wilson!
