GARLAND TELLS OF VISIT TO CLEAR LAKE

Linn County Senator Urges Continuation of Lebanon-Cascadia Road

The following letter was received today by the editor of the Democrat from State Senator S. M. Garland: I have just returned from Clear Lake where I remained with my family for some three weeks. I thought that it might be interesting to you to hear about the visit of Mr. Cecil of the Forest Service and Dr. Hewes, of the Rural Engineering Department, of the United States government.

I was with these gentlemen a few weeks ago at Crater Lake and I detailed to them as fully as I could the wonders and beauties of Clear Lake and the advisability of the Government doing something to put this wonderful lake and all of its beauties in easier access of the people. I think that they believed that I was drawing considerably upon my imagination when I told them about the lake and the scenery along the Santiam. They finally, however, promised me that they would visit me at the Lake the following week. After enjoying the hospitality of the people of the county, which was so generously extended, they came to the Lake and I took them in charge.

Through the courtesy of the Government officials I had the use of the Government cottage and its best boat on the Lake, and I took my Evenrude with me. So by this means I was enabled to go quickly from one point of the Lake to the other. I took them all around over the Lake and showed them its wondrous beauties. They were both ardent fishermen, and I want to tell you that I never saw men enjoy catching fish any more than these gentlemen did. Dr. Hewes had my favorite light rod and he hung an 18-inch trout. You may know that the rod was in great danger. Finally the Doctor landed the fish after five minutes effort, which reduced him almost to nervous prostration.

While, of course, I did not ask these gentlemen the nature of the report that they intended to make, I am very well satisfied that they will make a report very favorable to the Santiam route. Dr. Hewes told me that he would send, while I was there, Mr. Beezley, superintendent of road construction for the Government. Mr. Beezley came a few days before I left and I found him just as appreciative of the wonders and beauties of the Lake as were these other gentlemen. Mr. Beezley and his assistants are trying to locate a feasible route around the north side of Sand Mountain so as to avoid the mountain. I think that they have succeeded in locating a route which they believe will be feasible.

I am naturally very much pleased with what I believe to be the outcome of the visit to the Lakes that these gentlemen made at my earnest solicitation. If the Government takes hold of this project, it will build a road that will attract hundreds of tourists and Albany, Lebanon and every town in the county, as well as the county at large, will receive substantial benefit. I do not think that the people of the county fully realize what a attraction this road will be to tourists. Your recent trip to Cascade Springs, which furnished you only a glimpse of the promised land, will give you, I have no doubt, additional interest in this road.
