

WASHINGTON U. AGAIN RENIGS ON OREGON

Greatest Contest Scheduled for
Portland is Called off
at Seattle School

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 25.—Coach Claude J. Hunt's University of Washington warriors and Hugo Bezdek's Oregon Gladiators will not meet on the gridiron in 1917. Washington authorities today wired Oregon notice that the game scheduled

for November 10 at Portland will not be played. Dropping of the game was made necessary Coach Hunt declared, by the fact that Washington is unable to play a five-game intercollegiate schedule with the inexperienced team that will represent the university this year. Elimination of the Oregon game offered the most feasible solution of the problem.

Washington's schedule now calls for the following games: Whitman at Seattle, October 20; California, at Berkeley, November 3; O. A. C. at Seattle, November 17; and Washington State College at Seattle, Thanksgiving.

The foregoing dispatch from the

camp of the mighty University of Washington football squad makes it evident that Oregon fans are again doomed to disappointment as far as seeing the two big colleges clash on the gridiron this fall. Last year Gil Dobie escaped with a scoreless game by the goat's eyelash, and it is evident that the Seattleites fear Coach Hugo Bezdek's "Mighty Oregon" machine this year, even with the loss of such men as Mitchell and a number of the big stars.

The news of Washington's failure to meet Oregon brings keen disappointment to the fans of the Northwest. In the name of good sportsmanship, after all the accusations hurled at Washington supporters in the past when they refused to meet Oregon, this game, which was scheduled for Portland Nov. 10, should have been left on. It opens the road to criticism again and gives rise to the charge of cowardice on the part of Washington's mentor.

Great things are expected of Coach Hunt of Washington, who, at Carlton College, Minnesota, put out a team in 1915 which beat Chicago University, and last year ran up enormous scores on colleges in its class and made the big ones stretch to win. Hunt looks like a worthy successor of the foxy Dobie and a chance to try his system against Bezdek's would have been a big drawing card at Portland.

It looks like Oregon will again will have a good team this year, in spite of the fact that the larger portion of last year's national champions are in the Army and Navy. "Shy" Huntington, pronounced one of the greatest field generals in the country, will be at the helm again, but only because of the fact that the doctors said he had an "athletic heart" and was rejected by the United States Marines, where several of his team mates are.

The Marines, by the way, will have a football team on Mare Island, California, which will make the best college team in the country hustle to defeat. At least five of Oregon's crack players of 1916 are there, with some University of California men, our own Ed Bailey, former U. of O. and Multnomah star, besides several high class eastern and middle western players. John Beckett, captain of last year's Oregon champions, is manager of the Marines.

JUDGE STEWART EXPLAINS ENLISTMENT REQUIREMENTS

Postmaster C. H. Stewart returned Friday from Portland. While in the metropolis he called at the recruiting office and secured a list of the branches in which enlistments are still acceptable. Men who have not been called for examination under the selective draft still have the right to enlist.

Judge Stewart reports as follows: In the regular Army there are still vacancies to be filled in the Infantry, Field Artillery, Medical Department, Engineers, Quartermaster's Corps, and also the Signal Corps, providing the recruit has had some experience as telegraph or radio operator. In most cases recruits have had experience along some particular line of avocation of life that will fit them for holding some position that will enable them to draw larger pay than a common private soldier.

In joining the Regular Army the enlistment is only for a period of the present war, while in the Navy it is for four years. In the Navy the only branches yet unfilled are Machinists, Musicians and Cooks.

SOMME BATTLE PICTURES COMING TO GLOBE

Red Cross Secures Pictures of
Famous Battle to Be Shown
About October 1

The moving pictures of the Battle of the Somme, which were taken for the English government, will be shown in Albany at the Globe theatre about Oct. 1. They will be shown in connection with the Linn County Red Cross, which will benefit by the performance. Manager Cummings is bringing the films to Albany at a neat expense.

The Somme battle pictures show that terrible carnage at its worst. Two photographers were killed during the making of the pictures, but several cameras were in operation and many fine scenes were made. The "Tanks," another war picture showing the British tanks in action, will also be shown, making an eight- or ten-reel show in all. The pictures are said to be different from any other pictures yet made.

The films are not yet on the market, the prints still being in the process of the making. Albany will be one of the first cities on the coast to see the pictures.

The showing of the pictures will be a big affair. It is planned to invite every Red Cross chapter in the county to cooperate in making the thing a success. A committee composed of Fred Dawson, P. D. Gilbert, Rev. C. E. Gibson, W. G. Ballack, L. G. Le-welling and W. V. Merrill, will have charge of the advertising and boosting.
