Leaves for Missouri—

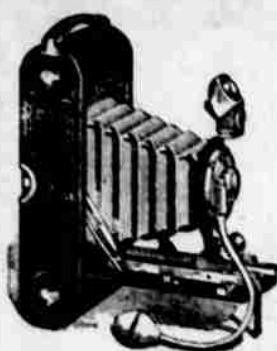
L. H. Scott left this morning for Joplin, Mo., to visit his parents, and make his home. Mr. Scott has worked for the Horskey harness shop for several years.
