DIRECTIONS FOR KNITTING RED CROSS SUPPLIES

All knitting should be done rather loosely on the proper needles. Needles and yarn will be supplied by the chapter, if necessary, but if individuals will buy the needles it will be a very material help and enable the Linn county chapter to spend more money for the yarn. The instructions from national headquarters give Linn county's quota as 500 sets of the 1,500,000 to be furnished by the American Red Cross.

Sweater

"Cast on 80 stitches; knit 2; purl 2 stitches for 4 inches; knit plain until sweater measures 25 inches; knit 28 stitches; bind off 24 stitches for neck, loose; knit 28 stitches; knit 5 ridges on each shoulder; cast on 24 stitches; knit plain for 21 inches; purl 2; knit 2 for 4 inches; sew up sides leaving 9 inches for armholes; 2 rows single crochet around neck and 1 row single crochet around neck holes.

Wristlets

"Cast on 48 stitches; knit 2 and purl 2 for 12 inches; bind off and sew up, leaving 2 inches open space for thumb 2 inches from top. Experienced knitters who wish may use three needles, casting on 52 stitches, 16-16-20.

Muffler

"Cast on 50 stitches or 11 inches. Plain knitting for 68 inches.

Socks

"Set up 60 stitches, 20 on each of three needles; knit 2 plain, 2 purl for 35 rows (4½ inches); 36th row knit 4 plain stitches, knit two together; repeat this until the round is completed. There are now 50 stitches on needles. Knit 50 rows plain until leg measures 11 inches (6½ inches plain knitting). Take half the number of stitches (25) on first needle for heel (leaving 12 and 13 stitches on second and third needles for instep; add on the 25 stitches; knit 1 row, purl 1 row alternately for 26 times (or 3 inches), always slipping first stitch. Begin to turn heel on wrong side; slip one; purl 13, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn work over, slip 1; knit 4, slip 1, knit 1, and pass it over slipped stitch, knit 1, turn, slip 1, purl 5, purl 2 together, purl 1, turn, slip 1, knit 6, slip 1, knit 1, and pass it over slipped, knit 1. Continue working toward the sides of the heel in this manner, leaving one more stitch between decreases on every row until stitches are worked in. There should then be 15 stitches on the needle. Pick up 13 stitches on side of heel; now knit the 25 stitches on second and third needles on to one needle, which becomes your second needle; with third needle pick up the 13 stitches on the other side of heel and knit 7 stitches off your first needle.

so that you will now have 21 stitches on first needle, 25 stitches on second needle and 20 stitches on third needle. First needle (a) knit to within 3 stitches of end, knit 2 together, knit 1. Second needle (b) knit plain; third needle (c) knit 1, slip 1, knit 1, pass slipped stitch over, knit plain to end of needle. Knit around plain (d) repeat a, b, c, d, until you have 13 stitches on first needle, 25 stitches on second needle, 12 stitches on third needle. First needle (e) knit 10 stitches, knit 2 together, knit 1; second needle (f) knit 1, slip 1, knit 1, pass slipped stitch over, knit 19 inches, knit 2 together, knit 1; third needle (g) knit 1, slip 1, knit 1, pass slipped stitch over, knit 9 stitches, knit 2 rows plain (h) Repeat e, f, g, and h, five times, then narrow every other row until you have 5 stitches on your first needle, 9 stitches on your second needle and 4 stitches on your third needle. Knit the 5 stitches on your first needle on your third. Your work is now all on two needles opposite each other. Break off yarn, leaving 12 inch-end. Thread into worsted needle and proceed to weave the front and back together as follows:

"Pass worsted needle through first stitch (*) of front knitting needle as if knitting and slip stitch off; pass through second stitch as if purling it, leave stitch on, pull thread through first stitch of back needle as of purling; slip stitch off; pull thread through second stitch of back needle as if knitting; leave stitch on. Repeat from (*) until all stitches are off needle. "Sock when finished should measure, foot, from tip of heel to tip of toe, 11 inches; leg, from tip of heel to tip of leg, 14 inches.

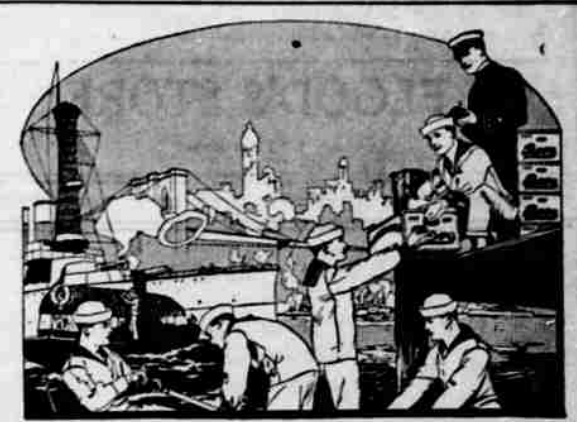
