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WILSON'S REPLY

Seldom in the history of the world and never before in the history of the United States has a statesman prepared a great state paper which met with more universal and unstinted approval than the reply made by President Wilson to the peace proposals of the Vatican.

The reply is not only a classic and a model in diplomatic usage. It is a full, complete and unabbreviated statement of the American viewpoint. We print below from the President's reply:

"The object of this war is to deliver the free people of the world from the menace and the actual power of a vast military establishment controlled by an irresponsible government, which, having secretly planned to dominate the world, proceeded to carry the plan out without regard either to the sacred obligations of treaty or the long established practices and long cherished principles of international action and honor; which chose its own time for the war, delivered its blow fiercely and suddenly, stopped at no barrier either of law or of mercy; swept a whole continent within the tide of blood—not the blood of soldiers only, but the blood of innocent women and children also, and of the helpless poor—and now stands balked, but not defeated, the enemy of four-fifths of the world.

"This power is not the German people. It is the ruthless master of the German people. It is no business of ours how that great people came under its control or submitted with temporary rest to the domination of its purposes, but it is our business to see to it that the history of the rest of the world is no longer left to its handling.

"To deal with such a power by way of peace upon the plan proposed by his holiness, the Pope, would so far as we can see, involve a recuperation of its strength and a renewal of its policy; would make it necessary to create a permanent hostile combination of nations against the German people, who are its instruments, and would result in abandoning the newborn Russia to the intrigue, the manifold subtle interference, and the certain counter revolution which would be attempted by all the malign influences to which the German government has of late accustomed the world."

Going over to Vancouver on the street car a gentleman next to me said: "How are you, Mr. N?" I said I was all right, except what was left. It was Professor Bolt, formerly of the Lebanon and Bend high schools. He was associated with Superintendent Hjordanson, whose name in Iceland means Thunder, so that the combination spells Thunderbolt, which they were in school work. But now they are separated, Prof. Bolt having accepted a position in the Y. M. C. A. war department, and is stationed at Vancouver barracks. He invited me to call on him before I left Vancouver.

In the afternoon I proceeded to do so, and was directed to a Y. M. C. A. building at the cantonment, the other side of the field. A man up in the loft of the building, taking a rest on his bed, heard that voice of mine, never to be forgotten if once heard, and rushed down the ladder for a greeting. It was Prof. McDonald, formerly of the Albany Y. M. C. A., one of the best fellows the sun ever shone on. He changed his clothes and showed me the ins and outs of the barracks, and even took me to the street car, after filling me on ice

cream, to see that the barracks city was relieved of my presence.

These little chance meetings with people we know and like form a pleasant chapter in the book of life.

Have missed the Albany tennis court this year. So have joined the Laurelhurst club, which has a fine court, in fact six of them, and more building. A big tournament is on. Among the players are Dr. Tracey Parker, formerly of Albany, and E. E. Aldrich, formerly of Lebanon, who married an Albany teacher, Miss Elkins. Both of them met their Waterloo, which would be my fate if I should attempt a match with many of the fast fellows playing.

Among the residents of Portland is Sam Logan, an old Albany boy. I haven't seen him yet; but intend to call at his home and see him. He is laid up with rheumatism.

Sunday I met a young man I knew, but couldn't place. He finally confessed that he was Arthur Wilson, who coached the famous girls' basket ball team of Albany College, which won the state championship in 1905. The girls are now scattered over the Northwest. Mr. Wilson has been a teacher of mathematics and playground work in Los Angeles for seven years, and is here on a visit.
