DUTIES OF DINING ROOM ORDERLY EXPLAINED

Washington, August 29.—Some time or other while you are at camp, you're going to be drafted for a month's duty as dining room orderly.

And woe be unto you if you mull your job. The Mess Sergeant, that monarch of the mess hall crowned with a white cap, will be good to your job. But if you flunk, O Boy!

So, for your advance information, here is a list of your duties:

Your boss is the Mess Sergeant. You are held responsible for the cleanliness of the dining room, pantry, the dishes and utensils.

If a plate, a spoon, a cup or whatever, is lost or broken, and you can't find it or name the man who is to blame for it, you're the goat. Upon being relieved at the end of your month's duty, all loss and breakage unaccounted for is charged out of your pay.

You've got to be at the mess hall not less than ten minutes before each meal. Then you cut the bread into thin slices and pile it neatly on plates one of which is provided for each table.

During the service of the meal, you stay in the bread room and cut bread, handing it out to the waiters as they call for it. And if you're wise, you'll stay there and cut bread, nothing else.

Be careful how you cut it along toward the end of the meal, too. If you cut more than the men can eat, and a lot is left over, you'll hear from the Mess Sergeant in no uncertain terms.

After the meal has been served, check up on every man's utensils, then take all the food left on the serving trays back to the kitchen. Whatever bread is left over in slices you pack closely in the bread box and serve it first at the next meal.

And don't throw away the bread crumbs that accumulate in the bread room and the pantry. Turn them over to the cooks. They can use them.

Then you clean the saltcellars, pepper boxes, vinegar cruets, mustard pots and sugar bowls and fill them for the next meal.

After breakfast you place the stools on the tables legs up. Then you sweep and mop the dining room floor, using as little water as possible, for the sake of avoiding sloppiness, and carefully dry it.

After dinner and supper, in addition to the aforementioned things, you sweep the dining room carefully. As soon as the floor is swept or mopped and carefully scrubbed, you set the tables, put the stools in place and make the dining room as clean and neat looking as possible.

That's the job. If you do it right, you will be commended. If you do it wrong you will be made to do it right.

NEW EXTENSION DIRECTOR EXPERIENCED FARMER

be with good equipment used on a commercial scale. This is a year of small crops and high prices. The way to make the limited supply go farthest and at the same time result in most profit to the growers is to see that it is properly graded, packed and marketed.

So in addition to the practice in packing and grading, a few lectures will be given by Prof. Lewis and his staff on the handling of fruit from the tree into the loading car.

Orchardists who are too busy to take all the course may take any part of it they can find time for. All the equipment and materials will be provided by the College, which will charge a fee of two dollars to help bear the expense of the course.

In many places women are preparing to take the place of men in packing, and those who wish to take the college course may do so on the same terms as the men.

It is desired that all prospective students send advanced notice to Prof. Lewis so that he may make arrangements for all.

MARKET CONDITIONS ARE VERY FIRM

North Portland, Ore., August 28.—General conditions in the market for the week's opening are a continuation of conditions prevailing at the close of last week. The string of material offered yesterday included 1800 cattle, 700 hogs and 400 sheep. The general tone of market conditions was steady, with a tendency to gain strength in the hog and sheep department.

Cattle

The yards were fairly well filled with a large variety in the bovine classes, including a few carloads of fairly good steers, which changed hands at \$8.50, and some good cows that passed at \$7.25. The best class of material was in demand, but ordinary to poor moved rather slowly. The great bulk of offerings in the feeder line found a demand, but conditions would not warrant any advance in price quotations. The following quotations obtained:

Best beef steer, \$8.25@8.75; good beef steer \$7.00@8.00; best beef cow \$6.50@7.25; ordinary cows, \$3.50@6.00; heifers \$6.75@7.25; calves \$6.50@9.25; bulls, \$4.50@6.50; stocks and feeders, \$4.50@6.75.

Hogs

The offerings in the hog alleys, generally speaking, were the best received for some time past, there being a number of carloads of well-finished animals, the great bulk of which sold at the top of the quotation which follows:

Demand continues to develop in the sheep department where trading for the early part of the week was enlivened by an advance in lamb classes, following the wether advance of the previous week. Following quotations are current:
