OUR FOREIGN-LANGUAGE PRESS

There is a wide-spread demand today for the abolition of our foreign language press. The demand is quite comprehensible. It is based on flagrant abuse of American tolerance and defiance of American ideals by a considerable section of that press.

Good Americans, whatever their origin, are naturally indignant that it should still be possible for lurking enemies to preach treason and sedition in alien tongues.

But there is another, brighter side. It is admirably presented in the plea of a good American named Louis J. Pirc, editor of a newspaper bearing the reassuring name of Clevelandka Amerika.

Mr. Pirc denies and refutes the sweeping statement that "the foreign language newspapers have no defensible place in the general scheme of American life, even in times of peace."

"We need foreigners here," he says: "to dig the coal, roll the steel, weave the cloth, etc. And as long as we need them, the question is how to utilize their labor force and implant in them an attitude of loyalty and devotion to the new land. Here is where the foreign language press has its noble, most important task. It is our duty and pleasure, who are editors and publishers of these foreign language newspapers, to Americanize our readers, to make them understand the spirit of the country they are living in."

Just to show what some of them are doing along this line, he gives the following information:

His own newspaper, a tri-weekly, always contains a special article and citizenship lesson written in English. For the past six years the paper has conducted at its own expense a free citizenship night school with an average attendance of 75 aliens. It gave over 2000 inches of space to the government in urging readers to subscribe to the Liberty Loan. As the official organ of Slavonian fraternal societies it was able to solicit subscriptions with unusual success. It is now conducting a national campaign to raise a fund for the purchase of tobacco as Christmas presents for American troops in France. The editor takes just pride in the part his paper played in informing immigrants concerning the military draft, and reconciling them to it. He holds that the usefulness of the foreign-language press will be ended only when the nation has "absorbed all its immigrants and turned them into good, loyal American citizens."

This defense commands respect. Obviously there is a place in American life for such journalism as the Clevelandka Amerika represents. We regret that the same cannot be said of all German-language newspapers, some of which have been egregiously un-American, and whose disloyalty may yet result in suppression.
