

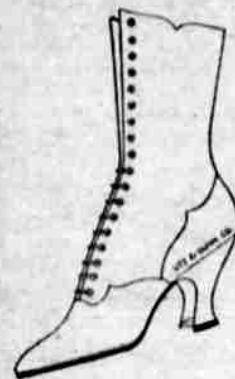

Light colored lace shoes in different shades with leather vamps and cloth tops prevail.

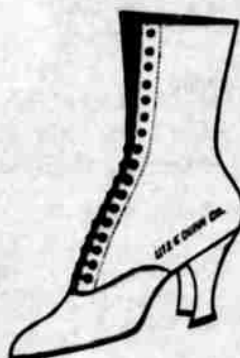
