BRIDGING THE ATLANTIC

The great peril has ceased to give
 serious concern. It will doubtless re-
 main while the war lasts, but
 being able to send men and ma-
 terials across the sea without fatal hin-
 drance.

Only one American ship out of 200
 has been sunk by a submarine since
 we entered the war. In no case have
 the Germans succeeded in sinking a
 fast or big ship. They have merely
 picked off a few slow tankers and
 freighters.

This good showing is due to the
 effective means found for fighting
 the sea pirates. Improved methods
 have been evolved and new devices
 invented. Nets to ensnare the un-
 wary submarine, mounted guns on
 merchantmen, smoke-boxes to hide
 a menaced ship, depth bombs that
 explode under water, swarms of sea
 planes and destroyers patrolling the
 steamer lanes—all these have had
 their effect. And now there are hints
 of a marvellous invention that will
 reveal the presence and location of
 any U-boat and thus facilitate its
 destruction.

Meanwhile our ship supply is in-
 creasing enormously. We have seized
 and utilized about 100 German
 vessels, the government has com-
 mandered 2,000,000 tons of shipping
 in process of construction. Contracts
 have been signed, or soon will be
 signed, for ships aggregating 8,000-
 000 tons more. We shall have, in a
 year or so, ten times as many ships
 in the foreign trade as we had three
 years ago.

There's no need to worry. We're
 going to make a bridge of ships
 across the Atlantic.

JURIES OF SIX

It is reported that the great need
 for men in armies and in war indus-
 tries has brought about the passing
 of an act in England reducing juries
 to six men instead of the usual twelve.

This is a startling jolt to the thou-
 sand-year-long legal habits of the
 human race. For fully ten centuries
 a firm faith in the all-wisdom of men
 in groups of twelve has been preva-
 lent in legal circles. Now, suddenly,
 the war, that wrecker of customs and
 conventions, has demanded that the
 omniscience of juries be compressed
 within the mental compass of only
 six good men and true. Litigants may
 vary with favorable or unfavorable
 decisions in their approval of the
 new system. It is likely, however,
 that most people concerned will
 breathe a sigh of relief.

GIRLS KEEP SOLDIERS' GRAVES GREEN

London, Aug. 15.—(By Mail)—(U.
 P.)—Twenty pretty young English
 girls, clad in the khaki of the wo-
 men's army, are in France working
 on the purely sentimental assignment
 of keeping the soldiers' graves green.
 They are the first batch of a much
 larger force to be sent over in time
 to see that the resting places of Eng-
 land's sons are kept covered with a
 blanket of grass and flowers. Among
 the force will be sisters of soldiers,
 likely a scattering of girls whose
 brothers or sweethearts lie buried be-
 hind the battlefields of today. Kew
 Garden is furnishing most of the re-
 cruits.
