ANOTHER COLLAPSE

The Socialist movement in the United States seems to have collapsed, largely as a result of the senseless opposition of Socialist leaders to the American war policy and their virtual championship of Prussian autocracy. Or rather, the Socialist organization has collapsed. Whatever was vital in the movement itself goes right on, despite the repudiation of official spokesmen.

Lately we have been witnessing the collapse of another organization, often confused with Socialism by loose thinkers, but far different in purpose and inspiration, and incomparably alarming. The I. W. W. seems to be on its last legs.

This statement may surprise great numbers of people who have overlooked the recent indications of crumbling in that notorious organization. It is but a few weeks since a considerable part of the Union was worried by sudden, violent outbreaks against selective service and by the widespread calling of strikes in important war industries. Armed mobs of I. W. W. members appeared in some of the western states. It looked as if Uncle Sam was in for serious trouble.

Stern measures were taken at once. And the moment the force of local sentiment for law and order made itself felt, and the government announced its determination to put down sedition and treason with a strong hand, the redoubtable I. W. W. melted away like a fog in the morning sun.

It isn't quite gone yet. We still hear rumbles of it here and there. Occasionally we find a little group of the disgruntled—poor and ragged because they refuse the good jobs offered them—singing the characteristic indecent and un-American hymn: "Onward, Christian soldier! Rip and tear and smite. Let the gentle Jesus bless your dynamite."

MORALS OF ENLISTED
MEN WILL BE GUARDED

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 7.—City and county authorities here today are determined to protect the morals of the conscripts in training at Camp Lewis, American Lake. Men convicted of selling or giving liquor to soldiers will be severely dealt with. Federal Judge E. E. Cushman, ignoring recommendations for clemency made by federal agents and Assistant District Attorney Fishburne, show the spirit manifest in the case of John O'Malley. O'Malley is alleged to have given a soldier at Camp Lewis a pint of whiskey. Cushman sent him to the county jail for three months.

An effort may be made to import liquor into Tacoma or some of the surrounding towns for the soldiers," said one official today. "But we are prepared to enforce the law to the letter. The youth of the nation in training for democracy's war must be kept clean."
