### PREPARING QUARTERS FOR HOUSEHOLD ARTS

University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 12.—Mary Spiller Hall, the women's dormitory, is being remodeled to allow of the use of the lower floor for the courses in the new department of household arts. This department is to be headed by Miss Lillian Tingle, who for the last nine years has been head of the home economics work in the public schools of Portland, besides being a regular contributor on household topics to the columns of the Portland Oregonian. For the first term courses will be offered as follows: Elements of Cookery, Elementary Food and Nutrition, Textiles and Textile Fabrics, the Home, Furnishing the House, Sanitary Hygiene and Household Sanitation, Household Budget-Making. The addition of the new department is expected to increase the enrollment of girls in the University in 1917-18.

### EARLY SIGNS INDICATE GOOD FALL ENROLLMENT

University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 12.—Everything indicates a good enrollment at the University of Oregon when college opens Octo-

ber 1," said Registrar A. R. Tiffany today. Mr. Tiffany bases his estimate on responses to letters recently sent out to those who were students at the University last year asking them to indicate whether they expected to return this fall. The responses indicate that for every student who will not return or is undecided, six expect to be on hand when college opens. Though more than 150 men who were students in the University last year are now enlisted in some branch of military service, the returns indicate that as many men as women expect to go on with their education at the University next term. With the opening of college nearly a month later than last year, nearly as many applications are on file as at this time last year from students who will enter as freshmen.
