AMERICAN CAPTAIN'S TALK ON DRINK CURES SERGEANT

American Field Headquarters, France, Aug. 21—(By Mail)—The sergeant had been drinking. It is against the regulations, and especially against the spirit of the new American Army for a soldier—and a sergeant, of all soldiers—to get drunk. So when the sergeant awakened he knew he faced a storm. But the morning routine in camp passed as usual. There wasn't a word of reproach. If the Captain knew, he wasn't

letting on. At noon-time the Captain hurried through his lunch and walked over to where his boys were sitting eating. The sergeant knew the worst was about to happen. Without a word to the non-com the Captain called on all men of more than one year's experience to withdraw 200 yards. "I want to have a little talk with the recruits," he said. "A non-commissioned officer, who knows better, came in drunk last night. He has been in the army for a long time. I've always told you to observe the older men and follow their example but you've got to use your man's sense in the army. "You're all getting more money than you reasonably need over here. I can't dictate what you are going to do with it. "But I hope you'll not go and blot up a lot of drinks. "Every day I get letters from your mothers and sisters and the girl who is waiting for you back in the U. S. A. asking me to see that you don't go wrong in the Army. I'm bound in honor to reply to all those letters—and tell the truth—about drunkenness for example." Since that talk the company hasn't had even a mild case of "jingle". The sergeant is still a sergeant. When he walked up to the Captain the night after his fall to ask for another chance the Captain merely held up his hand

Mr. Wiles then offered to compromise at \$300 and the rest of the members acquiesced. The city attorney was instructed to prepare the necessary ordinance, which will be passed at the next meeting on Sept. 26th.

The committee on Accounts and Current Expenses submitted its report, which allowed bills amounting to over \$900.

The application of C. G. Brown for speed cop was read and placed on file.

A petition was read, signed by A. H. Banks and B. W. Taylor, asking that a sidewalk be ordered in front of lots 5, 6, and 8 in Block 2, Hackleman's Addition. Referred.

Martin Ludwig petitioned the council for permission to install a gasoline filling station at Second and Ferry streets.

An ordinance declaring a surplus on account of the improvement made by Mrs. F. M. Francis of the alley 3. The surplus amounts to \$7.27 per cent of the estimated cost, amounting in all to \$69.53.

A similar ordinance was passed for the improvement of Baker street from Third street to 9th street, amounting to 10.31 per cent, or \$355.63.

A bill amending the ordinance regulating the fire department was passed. The salary of the chief engineer was fixed at \$200; the engine man at \$90; the auto driver at \$75. The assistant chief and six firemen will be paid \$75 per month.

The appointments of Mrs. H. F. Merrill, Dr. C. V. Little and A. C. Schmitt as members of the library board were confirmed.
