Conrad Andre, German vice-consid at Celou-Hlo Illo and other islands, is alleged to have surrounded himself with number of l'ilipones and sought to gain strength for an insurrection by promising the Filipinos, among other things, any white auman in Caba they would rebel-

It is suspected Andre tried to make a submarine base of the Phillipse Islands, for subsequently a ship ing complete machinery for establish ing a shop and outlit, was detained off the islands.
