Plot Discovered to Create Rebellion of Philipinos Against U. S. Government

### NATIVES PROMISED ANY WHITE WOMAN ON ISLANDS

### German Vice Council Would Gain Islands for Submarine Base

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The United Press learned that German intrigue tried to create an insurrection in the Philippine Islands. Conrad Andre, German vice-consul at Cebu, Ilo Ilo and other islands, is alleged to have surrounded himself with a number of Philipinos and sought to gain strength for an insurrection by promising the Philipinos, among other things, any white woman in Cebu if they would rebel.

### 2400 WALK OUT IN SAN FRANCISCO

### A Thousand Pattern Makers Walk Out of Wooden Ship Yards in Portland

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The most serious strike in the history of the Pacific coast began this morning following the walkout of 2400 iron workers and the stopping of work in every San Francisco bay shipbuilding plant. Itoting is reported in sections. A dozen streets of the United Railways were partially wrecked this morning and a number of strikebreakers were beaten.

### RUSSIANS PRESS ON TOWARD RIGA

Advance Seven Miles on Wide Front in the Last Seven Days

### KORNILOFF REBELLION EASILY SUPPRESSED

### Russian Government is Stronger Than Ever; General Korniloff to Live

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The Russians are driving toward Riga on a wide front. The last five days the Russians have advanced over seven miles, the Russian embassy announced.

The whole Russian military establishment is being reorganized under General Alexieff. Commanders are being ousted. Official cables from Petrograd are most encouraging and show that the Korniloff rebellion was suppressed without bloodshed.

### 9000 SOLDIERS WILL PASS ALBANY IN WEEK

Arrangements to Be Made to Feed Members of New National Army in City.

This morning a train of 28 empty coaches passed through the city en route to Oakland. About 9,000 men will return on these coaches, going to American Lake. The first train will contain 500 men and will pass through the evening of Sept. 20th. On the evening of Sept. 23d three more trains of 1600 men will pass through and on Sept. 25th another train of 400 will arrive. All will pass after 5 o'clock in the evening.

Operations in Balkans Indicate New Offensive; Cadorna's Troops Win

### WILL ADVANCE BEYOND SAN GABRIEL AT ONCE

### The British Naval Planes Drop Bombs on German Boats Near Ostend

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The Italian offensive cannot be considered ended. State Department Rome cables stated today that Italian operations in the Balkans indicate a new offensive there, while Cadorna's troops are winning fresh victories in the Bainsizza Valley.

Preparations are being made to continue the advance beyond San Gabriel.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—The British navy planes scored hits against a large German destroyer and several trawlers in an air raid between Ostend and Blankinberge, the admiralty announced today.

British Successes—LONDON, Sept. 17.—Gen. Haig reported that English and Scottish regiments last night successfully raided the Germans east of Epehy. German dugouts, trench mortars, emplacements and ammunition dumps were destroyed.
