A HOMING DIPLOMAT

The sympathy of a critical but unkindly world goes with Count Luxburg, the German charge d'affaires at Buenos Aires, as he shakes the dust of indignant Argentina from his feet.

The natural presumption is that he will go home. There is no welcome for him anywhere else. But how can he get there? Argentina doesn't feel like lending him a warship.

He has to run the gauntlet of the very U-boats which have been sinking Argentine merchantmen, and to whose tender mercies he wished to consign the rest of the Argentine shipping.

It must be a cheerful thought to Luxburg, as he fares homeward darning his diplomatic tin can behind him, that he himself may be "spurlus versenkt."

"VICTORY" WAR SLOGAN OF BUSINESS MEN

ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 20.—(U. P.)—With "victory" as their slogan, American business men here today convened for the third day of their first war convention.

President Wilson in person, or a message from him through one of his cabinet members, will be an outstanding feature.

Prices, priorities, industrial relations, diplomatic problems—the whole sweep of war's intricate questions—will be treated in addresses by the country's war chiefs and distinguished foreign representatives.

When the meetings close on Friday, America's business men will be in step with the country's march against autocracy, "showing the whole world," said President R. G. Rhett, Charlestown, S. C., "in what spirit and with what determination business faces the task ahead."

What may be done to control prices and profits will be one of the biggest problems before the business men. Secretary of War Baker, Secretary of Interior Lane, Food Administrator Herbert C. Hoover and Chairman Frank A. Scott of the War Industries Board, who are on the program, may touch on the price question. They will appeal for cooperation in war work.

President Rhett's message on private interests during the war is: "Every business man, firm or corporation must subordinate individual interests to the common cause. This they are ready to do, all that is needed is direction."

Secretary Elliot H. Goodwin stated that the Chamber of Commerce had gone flatly on record against war profiteering. "It must not be overlooked, however," he said, "that business cannot live without profit. That is the rule of the game. Patriotic business men are perfectly ready to work on another basis so long as they can live, but they must have clearly indicated what the new basis will be."

Special interest is shown in the address of Boris Bakhmetieff, Russian ambassador, and of Lord Northcliffe, chairman British Mission, who are on the program. Among prominent business men who will be heard by the convention are A. C. Bedford, president of Standard Oil, and George M. Reynolds, Chicago banker.

The discussion of readjustments to follow the war will deal with the course of prices, the return of the army into civil and industrial life and the new international relations of the United States.

Under ways and means by which business may most readily adjust itself to war conditions will come discussion of industries not essential to war. Food conservation, labor troubles and foreign trade also will be taken up.

How business may render greater service in winning the war will be a major topic throughout the convention. "The Chamber's Executive committee," said President Rhett, "believes that the time has arrived when the business men of the nation should see what they may do to develop greater efficiency and render greater service in carrying the war to a quick and successful conclusion."

HEART OF LATE MAD KING OTTO PLACED IN IRON URN

LONDON, Sept. 1.—(By Mail)—With solemn ceremonies the heart of the late mad King Otto of Bavaria was recently removed from the Chapel Royal of Munich where the remains are buried, to the Church of Altoettinge, near Passau, where the hearts of all Bavarian kings are kept in gold urns.

Owing to the war the urn of Otto is iron.
