GERMANY'S BELGIAN CONDITIONS

The German chancellor suggested, in his supplementary note to the Pope that Germany may be willing to withdraw from Belgium "under certain conditions," and even to pay "her share" of the damage done in Belgium.

Among the conditions he mentions are the retention of economic privileges and strategic advantages by Germany, assurances that Belgium will enter into no sort of political alliance with any power except Germany, and the division into two virtually independent districts—all calculated to leave Belgium about as "free and independent" as Poland under the new Prussian protectorship.

Such conditions mean the practical annexation of Belgium to serve the purposes of the German Empire, a vassal state maintaining a hollow fiction of self-government. It is unthinkable that Belgium, Great Britain, the United States or any of the other allies should ever consent to such a mockery.

As for Germany paying "her share" of the money needed for the physical restoration of Belgium, the answer is simple. Germany's share is all of it.

There can be no war settlement on any other basis. There can be no beginning of a peaceful adjustment by the warring powers until the German government reconciles itself to unconditional withdrawal from Belgium and full reparation for the injuries she has inflicted.

This is fundamental and absolute. In the matter of Belgium, at least, it is the civilized world, not Germany, that will name the conditions of peace.
