**Albany Banks Stand Seventh on Deposits**

Albany's four banks contain a total of \$2,546,790.70, according to a report compiled by State Bank Examiner S. G. Sargent from the bank statements of Sept. 11. Albany stands seventh on the list with Portland, Pendleton, Salem, Astoria, Eugene and Baker above her. The Portland banks contain a total of \$94,961,251.94. There are 25 cities and towns in the state with more than a million deposits.

There are 262 banking institutions in the state, located in 162 towns, with total deposits on September 11 of \$181,250,565. The 95 banks in 25 towns mentioned hold 82.3 per cent of deposits of the entire state.
