How I Am Doing My Bit to Help America

MACDONA, Texas, Oct. 13.—I registered myself and 48 others for selective draft, June 5th, without one cent cost to the government.

Myself, wife and child have become members of the American Red Cross. I have secured in this place and surrounding country, 52 members for the American Red Cross and collected nearly \$100.

I have purchased a Liberty Bond and induced several others to buy bonds.

I have impressed upon shippers the necessity of loading cars to full space and weight capacity, and seen to it that they did it.

I have urged shippers and consignees to load and unload cars with all the speed possible.

I am using small and light cars for light loading.

I am forwarding loads and empties on the first available trains.

I have instructed all my men to report disloyalty and treasonable acts.

I am remembering at all times that I am an American, with true and undivided loyalty to but one flag, "Old Glory."

French Girl Organizes a Woman's Regiment

LOWELL, Mass., Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—Unknown, unheralded, a few weeks ago Emma Le Clair, a pretty brown-eyed French girl of 20 years, stood before a loom in a big knitting factory here.

Today she is commander of probably the only woman's military organization of its kind in the country, Company A, First Women's Regiment of Massachusetts.

The regiment numbers 100 and is increasing rapidly. Under Miss Le Clair's guidance these girls are learning the meaning of military discipline and how to shoulder a gun.

"We want to drill, to be ready if we are needed," Miss Le Clair said, speaking of her command. "At least we can be used as messengers and can help in the war in many ways."

Later this girl commander plans to organize other companies throughout the state.
