POTATO WEEK

It seems odd that the public mind should have to be urged to eat potatoes this winter, when we remember how eager the same public was for that vegetable last winter, and how keenly everybody felt the deprivation caused by scarcity and high prices. Yet here is the department of agriculture, in collusion with the food administration, establishing a "potato week" and asking the whole nation to celebrate it.

With the coming of a big crop, it seems, and attendant low prices, we have fallen into our old supercilious attitude toward the humble tuber. No more do potatoes, baked or boiled, mashed or fried, make our mouths water. We can eat them or let them alone. We hunger for higher-priced viands.

Let us celebrate this festival, nevertheless, in recognition of the providential bounty of a record crop, and in preparation for a winter and spring of patriotic eating. It isn't necessary to cram ourselves with potatoes to the point of nausea—that would defeat the purpose of the feast. But let every family and every individual make a point, in the week of Oct. 21 to 27, of eating potatoes liberally say twice a day. And let every housewife and every restaurant cook exert her or his utmost effort to serve them in the most varied and delectable forms known to the culinary art.

We must eat potatoes from now until next summer, to save wheat. And if we work it right, we can have a most enjoyable time doing it.

REGISTRATION AT O. A. C.

EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS

CORVALLIS, Oct. 16.—(Special to the Democrat)—Students old and new are fairly pouring into O. A. C. Registration at the end of the second day had reached 1256, only two behind that of the second day last year, which was far above that of any former record. The registrar's office has not been able to check results for the four days ending Thursday, but gives out the general report that it will probably be ahead that of the fourth day last year.

This condition is unique among the educational institutions of the country. Reports from the leading colleges and universities in all parts of the United States show that attendance is cut down far below normal, while enrollment here is already above normal and equal to or greater than that of last year.

Men outnumber the women registering, but the ratio is about three to two instead of two to one, as heretofore.

EXPOSED BY WAR OFFICE

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(By Mail)—The war office has uncovered a unique method of evading military service.

When Sidney Drew, a young commission merchant, was arrested on another charge he was found to have a certificate of exemption certifying that he was a hunchback. He admitted that a group of men had hired a hunchback to present himself for each of them as their summons came to procure exemption certificates.

Meantime the hunchback had joined the navy and drowned in a ship sunk by a submarine. The war office is searching for the other members of the evading group.
