SOLDIER DOGS IN FRANCE

Dogs may be a luxury and extravagance and source of waste in civilian life in wartime. In the army they are doing their bit to save men's lives.

A writer in the New York Times Current History magazine describes the new role of the dogs on the French front. Formerly the chief work of the military dogs was to carry help to the wounded and to hunt for disabled soldiers in out of the way places. Next the canine warriors were used to accompany patrols to scent out the enemy. In Belgium these dogs were used to draw machine-guns.

Now the dogs do all these things, and a more important work besides. They carry messages back and forth between the first-line fighting troops and the commanding officers at the rear. This is exceedingly dangerous work. A soldier doing it would stand many chances of being killed or wounded before his errands were done. The dogs run the same risks. Many of them are killed. But every dog lost while performing this dangerous task saves the life of a man.

The dogs receive special training for this work. They have to be accustomed to the heavy firing. But they are unfailingly loyal. No messenger dog ever fails to deliver his message unless he is "killed in action."
