LIEUTENANT ROY WOOD WRITES FROM WASHINGTON

To Leave First of this Week for France; No Time to See Washington

The following letter was received yesterday from First Lieutenant Roy Wood:

Washington, D. C., 10-14-17; 20th Engineers, Camp America Unit.

"As we expect to at least start for France this week, I am going to take just a minute to write you a note.

"Had a very pleasant trip across the country but have not been able to see much of the city. I was of the opinion that I would have some leisure time, but that was a mistake, as there is not a minute of the day but that I have about two jobs for it.

Upon arriving and reporting at the camp I was unfortunate enough to be assigned to a company as acting captain and believe me, it is no job at all, but the office and paper work is something a civilian cannot imagine, especially now when many new recruits are coming in. I have worked practically every day from 5:15 a. m. until midnight and then can just keep even with the game; but we expect to leave for France some-

time this week and I hope by that time things will be in such a shape that the work will be a little lighter. Our company now has a captain, which relieves me considerably.

At this camp with us is the 30th Engineers (gas and flame), a regiment which will have charge of and instruct the other troops in the use of bombs of all kinds, liquid fire, poison gas, etc. They are doing a great deal of experimenting and their work is very interesting.

"I am enjoying the work very much and take a lot of interest in it.

From what I have seen I don't care much for the East—the people do not have the "get up" to them that is so common to the Westerner and accommodation and courtesy is practically unknown.

"I'll drop you a line when we arrive in France.
