An Amherst professor, returned from spending his vacation working for the Red Cross in France, speaks of the cost of war:

"Perhaps," said he, "the first impression is what war costs the non-combatants—the aged, the helpless, the very young.

"One who has been in France never thinks of war without seeing the children—looking like little birds with reed-like arms and legs, with scrawny faces and too-old eyes.

"I think of the little girl I saw in Hove, who had lost her right arm because the retreating army had buried a shell in the coal where she went to get the daily fuel for her mother.

"Or I think of the boy at Marigny who had lost one of his legs from shell fire; or the little child I saw at Toul who had been literally frightened out of her wits by the shock and horror of the battlefield, and sat gazing furtively into space.

"France is full of these sick children, sick because they have been deprived of the care of their parents, because they had no shelter from rain and storm, because of the lack of food."

Take occasion, today or tomorrow, to walk past the nearest schoolhouse in the morning before the bell rings, at noon, or at the close of school. Mark the rosy cheeks, the happy faces, the comfortable clothing, the crisp new ribbons, the vigor and the fun.

That is the way children should be—safe, happy, protected from evil. To procure these blessings for all the children of the world, the allies must win the war.
