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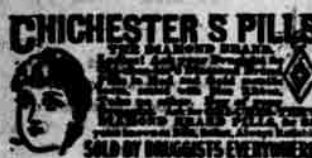

GETTING CLOSER TO CANADA

Our diplomatic business with Canada before the war was always transacted through the British foreign office at London. Lately, this roundabout method has been found inconvenient, and communications between Washington and Ottawa have gone through the British embassy at Washington.

Now we are to be placed in closer touch. Canada will be represented directly at Washington by a commissioner, with ministerial powers. For this important post has been chosen J. D. Hazen, a member of the Borden coalition cabinet, formerly premier of New Brunswick and commissioner of naval service, marine and fisheries.

The United States welcomes this innovation. It is a recognition of the fact that the Dominion is, in nearly everything but name, practically an independent republic. As such, it is much better, whether in war or peace for her to deal directly with us. Most of the matters of mutual interest to Canada and the United States are of a purely American nature, which ought not to be subjected to the misunderstanding and delay incident to supervision by a European government. Canada is quite able to manage her own affairs. Now that she has attained this dignified and self-respecting status, Americans hope she will maintain it permanently.
