OUR LATEST ALLY

Mexico, after hating and fighting us for years, seems on the point of changing into a warm friend and ally. The new Mexican minister to Italy, celebrated his arrival in Rome a few days ago, by issuing a statement in praise of the United States. "The Nightmare of imperialism has vanished since the United States entered the war," he said. "Our relations with our great northern neighbor, after our crisis, have now entered a period of cordiality. The United States, in entering the world conflagration for the liberty of peoples and respect for the rights of small nations, has formulated a principle which completes the Monroe Doctrine. This establishes forever the position of Latin-American countries with regard to the United States."

This may be taken as an authoritative expression of present Mexican policy. It is supported by the action of the Mexican congress, which is undertaking to commit the government to a declaration of benevolent neutrality toward the United States. A resolution in the senate announces that "Mexico, doing honor to her history, her ideals of progress must be with the nations that fight for justice, for civilization, for liberty, which is Mexico's own cause." There is a similar measure pending in the chamber of deputies. There is said to be a strong desire in both houses to go so far as a complete break with Germany.

General Obregon, formerly known as the ablest of Carranza's subordinates, now retired to private life, corroborated this view in New York the other day. He asserted that the Mexican people are "friendly toward the United States."

We can well afford to be magnanimous toward a Mexico in this mood. We have never had any unworthy designs against her, and we rejoice that she has found it out. We have suffered much at her hands, but we're ready, as a government and as a nation, to reach out our hand and welcome her to the great fellowship of world-democracy, fighting its supreme battle against tyranny and brute force.
