CAMP LEWIS A PLACE OF WONDERS SAYS DR.

Dr. B. R. Wallace, first lieutenant
in the Medical Reserve Corps, station-
ed at Camp Lewis on a board of
12 physicians employed in examining
the large draft army for chest and
heart trouble, relates many interesting
incidents about the great cantonment.

He returned to Tacoma Sunday and
expects to be back in Albany Novem-
ber 10th to perform some operations,
and will be in his office for two days.

There are 300 doctors at the camp,
all busy examining the constant
stream of soldiers. When the other
doctors get through with the men
they are turned over to the board of
which Lieut. Wallace is a member,
and are given a thorough examination
for heart and lung disorders. If any
doubt exists an X-ray plate is made,
chemical analysis made and other
measures taken to be sure that the
man is in perfect condition to stand
the strain of warfare.

When many of the men reach the
camp they are rebellious, there against
their will, and want to get out of it.
They will do everything to try to
be sent home on account of physical
defects. If the doctor thinks that the
man is fit he will tell him to come
back in a week for another examina-
tion.

In nearly every case the men come
back ready to be given a clean bill
of health and want to stay. There
is something fascinating about the

life that makes the men like it and
want to stay in it. They entirely
change their views after a few days
at the camp and decide that soldier-
ing is not so bad after all.

There are 31,000 men there now
and 8,000 more will arrive this week.
There will be 51,000 there in all when
the camp is filled, in a short time.

The amusement feature is a great
part of the life. There are 40 foot-
ball teams at the camp. There is
talent to spare in every line imagin-
able. Dr. Wallace states that the
other evening he witnessed a number
of boxing bouts that were better than
many he would have paid \$5 a seat
to witness. If it is decided to put on
a vaudeville show inside of an hour
an aggregation is collected that would
put to shame the average bill seen
on the regular vaudeville circuits.
Professional performers are there
from all over the country. There
is something going on at all times
and the men are keyed up to some-
thing every minute of the day.

The large mass of men are handled
in fine shape. The feeding of the
army is done in a creditable manner,
and good, wholesome food is given
to the boys in ample quantity. Drill,
exercise, schooling, recreation, morals
—all are cared for in a most efficient
manner.

Lieut. Wallace has met many Al-
bany boys at the camp, among them
being Lieut. Lee Bennett, Lieut. F.
S. Stellmacher, Buil Payne, Orville
Montieth, Sanford Archibald, Gray
and many others. Sanford Archibald
is making good as a linesman in the
ambulance company football team.

fair sum.

of O. A. C., and others interested
in the culture of the walnut.
