Now guard, at best, gave a week of rest, and drilling a company. Was not half bad, not half as sad as standing at reveille. Now Miles would work, no duty shirk but one thing he would dread: Far worse than all was the bugle call when he was snug in bed.

Long hours of drill gave him a thrill, a whole day's march was fun. With wood he made a hand grenade for practice on the Hun. He did not mind these tasks nor find them very hard to do. He built a trench, he studied French he worked from dusk till two.

Now in this life of work and strife some little storms arose. But he mastered all and did not fall from his state of calm repose. Till the awful note from the bugle's throat drove from him all rest. And soon became in this war game his only dreadful pest.
