STOCKYARDS MARKET REPORT

NORTH PORTLAND, Oct. 30.—Operations in the market at the Portland Union Stock Yards opened for the week with a full house. Conditions in general are not discouraging, yet the market is not as brisk at this writing as it has been in recent weeks. In connection with the tendency to slow up which appeared in the cattle market last week, it might be interesting to stock producers to know that this month's volume of business in the Portland Union Stock Yards sums up to a greater volume by about 150 cars than any month in the history of the yards, and since there is a general shortage in the supply of hogs and sheep, this necessarily means a very heavy increase in the cattle shipments for the month.

CATTLE—The cattle department with 1700 head, a great portion of which arrived late for the opening market, was sluggish on account of a lack of the usual number of buyers. Those who were in the yards filled their orders at about steady prices in the steer department, but took the cows at 25c off at the top end and about 50c off at the lower end of the string. Bulls continue steady and stockers and feeders are a big element in the trading. We quote as follows: Best steers \$9.75-\$10; good steers \$7.75-\$9; good cows \$7-\$7.50; ordinary \$4-\$6; heifers, \$7-\$7.75; calves, \$7-\$9.50; bulls, \$4-\$6.75; stockers and feeders, \$4-\$7.25.

HOGS—The hog alleys were well filled for the week's opening with a

quality superior to that which has been offered during the past ten days. Central Oregon offered the best string of hogs on the market and the general tone of the market was about 25c higher right down the line. Sales in the hog department were more brisk than in the cattle department, and the general conditions showed a better outlook than had been evident for some days past. The following range of prices prevail: prime light \$15.75-\$15.85; prime heavy, \$15.65-\$15.75; bulk, \$15.75-\$15.85; hogs, \$13.50-\$14.

SHEEP—The sheep market continues steady to strong at the following prices with a bigger supply than has been offered through the early weeks of the month: yearlings, \$12-\$13; wethers \$12-\$13; ewes, \$8.50-\$10.50; western lambs, \$14-\$14.50; valley lambs, \$13.50-\$14.
