that before the death of his first wife, Funk flew into a rage one day, got into the wagon and drove all night and ended at his sister's home three miles away in the morning. Following that he deeded a piece of land that was mortgaged to his first wife, keeping an unencumbered piece himself and selling most of his property.

In 1903 it is said that he fell from a wagon, striking on his head and further rendering him incapable.

The heirs of Christian Funk would recover two deeds to land in Linn county, on which a value of \$18,000 is placed, together with other property valued at \$20,000. There is also property in Nebraska deeded to Mrs. Gordon, the total amount of all the property being over \$50,000. This property was held by Kern until Funk's death, when it was turned over to Mrs. Gordon.

Since coming into possession of the property, Mrs. Gordon has placed four mortgages on it, one of which is to the Federal Land Bank, of Spokane and on which she has not yet received the money.

At the request of the heirs Dan Johnston has been appointed administrator of the estate, and an effort will be made to regain what the heirs claim is their rightful share of the property.

Alleging that Funk was entirely incompetent to transact any business or to enter into a valid marriage contract, the heirs ask that all the deeds be cancelled, that the marriage be declared null and void and that all mortgages be cancelled insofar as they are void to the plaintiffs.

AMERICAN EXPORTS SHOW DECREASE FOR SEPTEMBER

American exports in September totaled \$456,201,567, according to a statement issued October 31 by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, of the Department of Commerce. This is a decrease of approximately \$34,000,000 compared with August, but a gain of \$80,000,000 as compared with July. For the nine months ended with September the total exports were \$4,007,817,178, a gain of \$657,000,000 over the similar period in 1916.

Imports in September also fell off, the total being \$236,196,989, as compared with \$270,509,379 in August. The total imports for the nine months ended with September were \$2,282,794,503, a gain of \$450,000,000 over the corresponding nine months in 1916.
