"CLEAR FIELD FOR HUNTERS"

With the current scarcity and high cost of meat comes a discontent with restrictive game laws. Here is a typical letter written to one of the newspapers:

"Would it not be well at this time, when public thought is concentrated on food conservation, to bring about a temporary repeal of some of our game laws? These laws under ordinary circumstances are extremely valuable in preserving game, wild fowl, etc. But just now any motorist can testify to the abundance of game and wild fowl.

"We need these food supplies to help out the shortage of food while our supplies are going to the men in the trenches. Could not some logical way be devised to let down these legal barriers so that the hunters could have a clear field?"

The writer's motives are unquestionably good, but the policy he recommends is dangerous and unwise. Most conservationists agree that the very thing the public authorities should not do at this time is to "let down these legal barriers so that the hunters can have a clear field." For, scarce as meat is at present, we must look forward to a time of greater scarcity.

There is no prospect of increasing the supply of standard meats in the immediate future. There is every prospect of further depletion, with higher prices. It may be a long war, making an increasing drain on all our food resources. Whenever peace comes, there will be no miraculous multiplication of food, particularly of meat, at once. It will take years to restore normal meat production.

There is special reason, then, to preserve and multiply our own supply of wild meat, by rational conservation methods, in every field where the wild animals and birds do not interfere with domestic food production. We shall need all the game we can produce, as well as all the domesticated herds and flocks. If hunters had a free rein for a single season, our game resources would be so decimated that it would take many years for them to recover.

Y. W. C. A. COMES TO RELIEF WOMEN WORKERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The War Work Council of the National Board of the Young Women's Christian association is raising \$400,000 for war work among women. This amount is expected to be enough to cover expenses until next June. If it is not sufficient, more will be raised. The council members for Oregon are Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett and Mrs. William Mc Masters of Portland.

Most of the sum will be spent here in our own country on women affected by the war. The soldiers' women folks appreciate the hostess houses in the military camps, for which \$900,000 is being spent. Thousands of girl munition workers and new government employees would have no decent place to sleep and no proper food were it not for the \$300,000 the War Council has appropriated for their needs.

For colored women's protection and assistance, \$200,000 has been appropriated. Another \$100,000 will be spent looking after women who cannot speak English and cannot therefore look after themselves.

GERMAN SUCCESS IS DUE TO SINGING—?

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—(U. P.)—Cromwell's squalidness who galloped into battle singing will be duplicated in the soldiers America sends across the seas. The old opinion of some military commanders—that the best brute is the best soldier—notwithstanding. Among the military instructors at cantonments will be found a division of singing instructors.

Congress ok'd their appointment in the war department' claim that the singing soldier is the hardest marcher and the toughest fighter.

"Send a regiment off on a hike and train them to sing as they march and they'll come back 25 per cent fresher than as if they had merely trudged along," one officer declared. "Our men aren't the right disposition to learn Puritan hymns. But a song like 'Pack up Your Trouble in Your Old Kit Bag,' makes a soldier cheerful, and a stale tired out one full of spirit and fight.
