STOCKYARDS MARKET REPORT

NORTH PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—(Special to the Democrat)—General conditions in the Portland Union Stock Yards are steady with some indications of advance, but no weak points. The receipts are a little below normal for the week's opening, carrying 1000 cattle, 1500 hogs and 1000 sheep.

CATTLE.—The string of cattle entering the yards for the week's opening shows a better per cent of quality stuff than in previous week. Some

choice steers for their class being grass-fed, were found in the market this week and changed hands at 9.00. Some signs of strength were shown in the cattle department over the close of last week and more particularly in the high-grade classes of stock. Some fairly good cows were sold on the market Monday morning at \$7.10-\$7.25. Disregarding the fact that cattle sold some stronger than at the close of the week, we are carrying a steady quotation which we believe to be low on the basis of the sales. Best steers, \$9.40-\$9.50; good steers, \$7.40-\$7.50; good cows, \$6.40-\$6.50; ordinary, \$4.40-\$4.50; heifers, \$6.50-\$6.75; calves, \$7.00-\$7.25; bulls, \$4.50-\$4.75; truckers and feeders, \$4.40-\$4.50.

HOGS.—A substantial strength was shown in the hog market this week opening when the general belief was expressed that the low water mark had been passed and that the preservation of the industry requires a profit-making basis for the hog producer. The general range of prices on the Portland market for the current season has been such as to guarantee a fair profit and encourage a hog-raising. Today's quotation is: prime light, \$16-\$16.25; prime heavy, \$13.85-\$14; bulk, \$12.75-\$12.85; pigs, \$14-\$14.50.

SHEEP.—Conditions remaining steady in the sheep department with fair shipments and ready transactions. Most of the lambs offered crossed the scales at the top of the quotations in their class, and all of the wethers changed hands at the top of the quotations which we believe indicates a healthy tone to the sheep market in general. The shipment of breeding ewes continues strong with a correspondingly strong demand. The following quotations obtain: Yearlings, \$12.50-\$13; wethers, \$12-\$13; ewes, \$8.50-\$10.50; Western lambs \$14-\$14.50; Valley lambs, \$13.50-\$14; breeding ewes, \$12-\$13 per head.

P. A. YOUNG TELLS OF ARMY Y. M. C. A. WORK

That the army and navy Y. M. C. A. must extend its work among the soldiers of Russia, France and Italy, that it must continue its work among the American troops at home and abroad; that it is the greatest influence for good among the enlisted men and that it makes for a better morale and a stronger army, is the assertion of P. A. Young, chairman of the Lion County Committee in charge of the Y. M. C. A. drive.

He says: "It is necessary to raise \$35,000,000 for this work and this will be attempted between November 11 and 19. Thousands of soldiers in letters written from overseas, from training camp and naval stations, have told of the benefits of the Y. M. C. A. They have shown that it is the only place where they can turn for recreation and entertainment after their day's drilling is over. They have, by the thousands, written letters home on Y. M. C. A. stationery from the Y. M. C. A. buildings. 'I don't know what we would do if it wasn't for the Y. M. C. A.' is a frequent expression of the soldier sailor."

"Captain H. A. Pearson of the Canadian army says of the Y. M. C. A. hut at Ploeghe St. Wood, 'somewhere in France': 'He says that at night the boys scurry up from the trenches, across a machinegun swept area in little groups and feel for the dark entrance and go in. It is only 1100 yards from the German artillery. No lights are allowed except a few candles in boxes. There is a phonograph and the Scotch boys pick out the Harry Lauder records and wear the face completely off them. The English

select American ragtime. The men swarm next to the flickering candles writing letters home. Some hold the paper on their hats, others write with the paper on the backs of their comrades. 'A soldier recites a poem, tells a story. There is subdued laughter. Old home songs are sung. Faces and nerves relax. Morale is strengthened. These men go forth better able to face their turn in the trenches.'"

BRITISH FEEL EFFECTS OF THE WAR KEENLY

E. E. Stead, inspector of dining cars of the S. P. Co., while here looking after the feeding of the soldiers in this city, displayed a letter from his brother who is manager of a large mill in London, in which some interesting sidelights of the great war are reflected. While, like other Britishers, he is holding on with grim determination against Germany, he is hoping for peace. The letter is part says:

"Our boy Fred has joined the army, being 18 years old last year. He said he was not going to wait until he was of military age for them to fetch him, so, getting our permission, he left school and joined the Liverpool Scottish, a killed regiment, where he had a very rough life until he became a corporal. Then things were better for him. He gave orders instead of having to obey them."

"Last September I applied for a commission for him in the Royal Flying Corps. After certain formalities had been complied with he was gazetted a lieutenant last April and he has practically completed his flying tests with the exception of a cross-country flight to be done, and even that may be done by this time. Then he may get a leave and the next thing will be France."

"This, my dear brother, is a dreadful time of anxiety for us. Our dear son is in the most perilous branch of the service. Any day he may meet his death—a nose dive, or something goes wrong and death stares him in the face. At the same time we are intensely proud of him. He is a splendid type of boy—courageous and fearless. Many of our friends have lost their sons and we have to face it as stoically as we can. We

hope and hope for peace and an end to the war.

"You, so many thousand miles away, can only faintly realize what it is to have the greatest war in history scarcely 200 miles from your door. All your conditions of life have altered. Nothing is the same. We work Saturdays and Sundays the same as any other day. This August holiday is the only serious holiday since 1914. The government realizes that the people, if they are not to break down, must have a rest."

LACK OF RIGHT FOODS BRING GERMANY TO TIME

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—Starvation cannot defeat Germany, but the lack of fuel foods may bring her to time, Dr. W. G. Bateman, assistant professor of physiological chemistry of the State University of Montana, said here today. "Of the foodstuffs, fats and carbohydrates, such as starch and sugar, are the fuel foods. That is why we hear so much about the want of fats in Germany, why soap is so expensive and why baths are prohibited except on Saturday," he said. "But if Germany had all the fats they needed would they be assured of winning the war as far as foods can help them? Decidedly not. The human body must have a proper mixture of proteins, carbohydrates and fats. One or two alone cannot maintain a people." Bateman believes it impossible for Germany to secure these three necessities—proteins, carbohydrates and fats—in their right proportions.
