RED CROSS NOTES

The membership of the American Red Cross has now passed the four-million mark.

With the division of the United States into 13 districts, each headed by a successful business man, serving his country through the Red Cross during the war, the Red Cross organization is now complete. Also special R. C. commissions made up of competent and sympathetic American citizens, have now arrived and are at work on behalf of the A. R. C. in France, Great Britain, Russia, Italy, Roumania and Serbia.

Mr. Franklin W. M. Cutcheon, lawyer in New York City, is the new Secretary-General of the A. R. C. He will act as director of Records and international interests, and will serve without pay.

Two new rooms adjoining the office rooms have been opened for the R. C. work. These will be used as headquarters for the three supervisors of the knitting, surgical supplies and hospital garments.

A new shipment of yarn was received today. Some have the slogan "A sock a day." The Red Cross knitters wish Albany would adopt "A Sweater a Week" at least for the present.

LaGrande reports a veritable beehive in their workroom. More than 300 in one day, turning out great quantities of work—over 600 garments in a single day. Hurrah for LaGrande.

The county chapters are doing splendid work—not a day but yarn or other supplies go out to the county auxiliaries.

France is calling for surgical supplies. Our boys are in France—yes, some already in the trenches—some wounded needing these same supplies. Albany women are not all awake to the urgency of the calls. Give at least one afternoon a week for work in the Red Cross rooms.

The executive committee wishes publicly to express its appreciation of the services donated by Mr. Summers, Mr. Nimmo and Mr. Rozelle. They moved heavy furniture to the fifth floor very promptly and with willing cheerfulness.

County and city R. C. workers again responded loyally to the call for donations to serve the draft men passing through this week. In the drive, the Linn County Red Cross gave in round numbers \$22,163. Albany's portion is estimated by the committee as \$6,097, leaving \$16,066 raised in the county. The War Council returned about 20 per cent—\$4,400—for home use, giving approximately \$3,195 to be divided among the various county auxiliaries and \$1,205 for Albany.

Many ask what the Red Cross does with all its money. This sum will probably not pay for all the yarn needed for the 500 knitted sets apportioned to Linn county. Then many bolts of both outing flannel and gauze are used besides incidentals, such as tape, thread, buttons, etc.

The question is not what do we do with the money, but how can we earn more money to supply the needs.

Christmas packages must be mailed before November 15th to reach men in foreign countries before the holidays. More detailed instructions will be given later.
