LABOR LEADERS WIRE PRESIDENT

Ask a Conference to Discuss
Labor Conditions All Over
the United States

SECRETARY BAKER ISSUES WARNING TO STRIKERS

Strike Which Is Delaying Work
on Destroyer Plant Must Be
Settled at Once

BUFFALO, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—The building trades heads at the American Federation of Labor convention here today wired the President and asked a conference to discuss the government work conditions all over the United States.

The request followed a telegram from Secretary of War Baker warning the heads of the building trades that strikes at Quincy, Mass., are delaying work on a destroyer plant that must be quickly settled.

Gompers suggested that some delegates to the convention employed by the Burns Detective Agency, were at the convention as spies in opposing the resolution demanding that a verbatim and permanent record be made of all proceedings. The convention decided to keep a permanent record only of important and special articles.

It is evident that labor is soundly patriotic. Patriotic speeches were loudly cheered.

BOYS CONFERENCE TO BE HELD AT EUGENE

The 12th annual Western Oregon Older Boys' Conference is scheduled for Eugene on November 30th, December 1st and 2d, under the direction of the Interstate Executive Committee, Young Men's Christian Association of Oregon and Idaho.

With the conference on a war basis taking as its theme, "The Challenge of War," other state organizations have felt the great need of such a conference, and are throwing their influence most heartily in the promotion plans. The Boys' Working Reserve, U. S. A., under the leadership of J. E. Brockway, state director; the State Sunday School association, thru Mrs. M. A. Danenhower, acting general secretary, are all cooperating magnificently with the Interstate Y. M. C. A. committee to bring together at Eugene on November 30th the strongest group of high school boys' leaders that has ever gathered in Oregon. The powerful influence of these boys, returning to their homes after the conference, should be felt for months.

A. N. Minton, secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., is district leader for Linn, Lane, Benton and Lincoln counties, and will take an active part in the conference. It is expected that a good attendance will go from Albany.

Secretary A. N. Minton of the Albany Y. M. C. A. is busy getting ready for the reorganization of the boy scouts for the coming year. A meeting will be held in the Y. M. C. A. rooms Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and all boys over 12 years of age who are eligible should be on hand if they are interested.

The coming year will be of great interest and intense value to the boys. The boy scout manual will be taken up. The signal code, used by the U. S. Army Signal Corps, will be mastered, giving the boys knowledge and working idea of the wigwag and semaphore signals. Scoutcraft, woodcraft, nature study and other things will be learned.

The coming summer also promises much for the boys; for Mr. Minton has in mind another fine trip. It may be to Cascadia and it may be some place else, but it will be at some well known resort and in an ideal place for "roughing it."

LOGGERS ARE NEARTY EATERS; AVERAGE 197 LBS.

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—A logger eats an average of 197 lbs. of food at each meal, according to figures compiled by W. C. Ruegnitz of the Bridal Veil Lumber company.

His figures are based on detailed reports from seven logging camps. The average total cost for each meal is placed at 27 cents by Ruegnitz.

The amount of food consumed at the various camps varied greatly, his figures show. At one camp the average was 285 pounds for each man's meal.

ITALIANS MAKING SPLENDID DEFENSE

Gallilo Is Retaken by Veteran
Italian Brigade After
Desperate Fight

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Official Rome cables declared that the entire Italian battle front is stiffening. The Italians successfully counter-attacked the German advance guards. Further Italian retirement is feared. Further Italian retirement is believed unlikely.

Veteran Italian infantry brigades reconquered Gallilo. The fighting here was desperate and both sides lost heavily.

Between the Tagliamento and Livenza rivers, a large detachment of Italians broke through an encircling body of Germans by a furious bayonet assault.

ROME, Nov. 13.—Every uniformed man has been taken from Venice and all civilians are leaving. If the Germans capture the city they will have no excuse for destroying the priceless works of art there.

ARMY Y.M.C.A. DRIVE MEETING WITH SUCCESS

Albany Subscribes One Third
of Quota First Day; Other
Towns Respond Well

That Albany will raise her quota of the funds required by the army Y. M. C. A. is indicated by the fact that one-third of the total sum required was subscribed the first day. The quota for Albany is \$230, and \$5,000 is the sum fixed for the entire county.

P. A. Young, chairman of the county committee, stated this morning that every report thus far received indicated that Linn county would experience no great difficulty in raising her quota. Mill City reported yesterday morning that the sum of \$150 had been raised the first day.

A meeting will be held at Shedd this evening and another meeting is scheduled for Lebanon on Thursday night.

According to a message received at local headquarters today from the chairman of the state committee, late reports from the fighting front indicate that the war will last longer than was at first anticipated, and the various county chairmen are therefore urged to secure an over-subscription of the quotas fixed by the state committee.

RUSSIAN REPORTS ARE CONFLICTING

Bolsheviki Claims a Complete
Victory Over Provisional
Troops

EARLY REPORTS TELL DIFFERENT STORY

Kerensky Said to Have Entered
Petrograd; Eight Hundred
Killed or Wounded

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Bolsheviks claim a full and complete victory at Petrograd, according to this afternoon's dispatches.

Two proclamations, pridefully announcing the entire defeat of Korniloff's and Kerensky's troops, were received.

The radicals call Kerensky and Korniloff counter revolutionists. The arrest of Kerensky has been ordered.

The Caucasus front armies' representatives adopted resolutions opposing the Bolsheviks.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 13.—Kerensky's troops have entered Petrograd and captured part of the city, according to a telegram agency dispatch. Kerensky now controls the Nevsky Prospekt.

The radicals are fleeing from Smolny institute, their governmental headquarters. The Bolshevik resistance is steadily reported weaker.

Salvors from the Kronstadt garrison are aiding the Bolsheviks. The radicals are well armed.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—It is authoritatively learned that 800 were killed and wounded in Petrograd, and 700 in the Moscow fighting. The number of casualties is steadily increasing as the fighting continues.

The latest Petrograd dispatches report a growing wave of anarchy, robbery, murder and rape. It is reported that Kerensky is heading two complete army corps near the city. The Bolsheviks are steadily weakening.

HYDE-BENSON CASE IN SUPREME COURT

Of interest to Linn county is the case of the State of Oregon, respondents, against the Hyde-Benson company, appellants, in the supreme court, the arguments in which will begin tomorrow and will extend over two days. This is the first time in years that the supreme court has granted two days to a case.

Seven counties are involved in the case. Six of them came up on appeal and have been united in one case. The seventh, from Klamath county, was decided in the circuit court of that district too late to be included in this suit; but the decision of the higher court will stand in this case.

ALLIES REPULSE GERMAN RAIDERS

Enemy Attacks Follow Heavy
Bombardment in Vicinity
of Rheims

SECRETARY BAKER COM- MENDS AMERICAN GUNNERS

U. S. Artillery Doing Splendid
Work in France; War
Dept. Optimistic

PARIS, Nov. 13.—German raids following an active bombardment east and northwest of Rheims, were repulsed, it is officially stated.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The American artillery in France is acquiring itself very creditably, Secretary Baker's weekly war summary declared. Baker declared that the Italian situation is developing normally. He declared the British capture of Passchendaele and the German's retirement from 40 square miles of territory north of the Aisne is the important event of the week.

TRIAL AT COURT HOUSE GOES ON SLOWLY

The trial in the case of the Oregon-Western Colonization company against the Forest-Hill Investment Co., and others, proceeds slowly. Judge Bingham is hearing testimony and it is probable that the trial will extend over Wednesday. This morning J. L. Blalock, of Arlington, who purchased \$40,000 worth of the land from the Forest-Hill company, was on the stand all morning fighting for his property rights, and will be on this afternoon.

There are many witnesses to be examined and the arguments of the attorneys is expected to take up considerable time.

LLOYD GEORGE IS TARGET FOR MUCH CRITICISM

LONDON, Nov. 13.—(U. P.)—Bitter attacks were made today upon Premier Lloyd-George following his frank Paris speech yesterday. Ex-Premier Asquith is plainly greatly excited, and demanded in the House of Commons this afternoon that Lloyd George explain his statements. The press is everywhere criticizing Lloyd George. Cheers greeted Asquith's demands in the House of Commons.

It is indicated that Lloyd-George will be forced to fight bitterly to maintain his position regarding the joint allied war council.

BIG GAME AT EUGENE ATTRACTS FANS ATTENTION

Albany football fans are looking forward with keen interest to the game at Eugene Saturday between the Universities of Oregon and California. Friday and Saturday will be the tenth annual home-coming days at the "U," and many old grads will return for another look at their Alma Mater and to witness the big game.

This will perhaps be the best game of the year in Oregon. While California won from O. A. C. by the score of 13 to 6, and went down to defeat before the marines by the same score as Oregon did, it looks like the two teams were evenly matched and a battle royal will ensue.

California has had a month's more training than the Oregon schools and has had more games, and should be in much better shape. But Oregon has strengthened in the past two games and should come through with flying colors. Johnnie Beckett, ex-captain of Oregon and captain and coach of the marines, has gone to Eugene to tell the players what he knows about California. Beckett played twice against the Bears.

California will also be weakened a little by the loss of two men in the draft.

The prospects are that a large crowd will go from Albany and other points in the state.

The home game will consist of a battle between Albany and Corvallis high schools. Albany has lost all of her games so far and may lose Saturday, but Corvallis will know that she has been in a game before the last whistle. The boys have been improving and should be able to give their rivals a real tussle.
